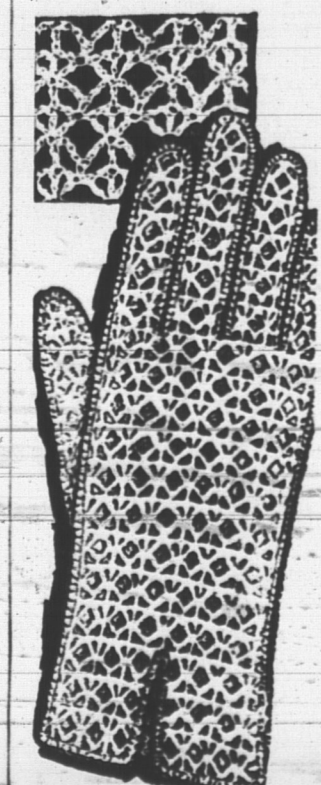
ELLEN'S DIARY

EGGS BENE-DICT WITH HOT MAYONNAISE SAUCE 2 tbs. room-soft butter or margarine 1/2 tsp. salt 3 tbs. flour 1/2 tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. pepper 1/4 c. milk 1 tbs. lemon juice 1/4 c. mayonnaise 3 English muffins 1/2 c. minced cooked ham, or 6 small slices ham 4 poached eggs (see Chef's 3 halved pitted black olives The Mayonnaise Sauce: In a double-boiler top; mix 1/2 cup milk 1 cup flour 1 tbs. baking powder 1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon First rinse blueberries with cold water; drain, and dry. Transfer to 2-in.-qt. saucpan. Dissolve cornstarch and 1/4 tsp. salt in cold water. Stir into berries; stir in sugar. Stir with kitchen fork until boiling. Slow-boil 8 min., stirring occasionally until berries are tender. Meantime, mix together butter or margarine and additional sugar. Gradually mix in egg and milk. Sift together flour, baking powder, 1/2 tsp. salt and cinnamon and beat into preceding mixture to make a batter. Pour hot cooked blueberries into an 8" x 11" buttered baking pan or oblong baking dish. Spoon batter over hot berries; bake 30 to 35 min. in moderate oven or until browned on top. Serve warm, cut in squares, in deep dessert dishes.

THE CHEF'S REVOLUTIONARY Easy Poached Eggs Mesdames: This new method of poaching eggs has three advantages: you poach the eggs over boiling water, instead of directly in the water; the eggs will not spread out or break; they can be prepared in advance and kept warm over the hot water until ready to serve. THE METHOD This is what you do: Thoroughly butter a round or oblong muffin pan with 6 compartments about 3" in diameter. Fit the muffin pan into the top of a utensil containing boiling water, or if this is not convenient, stand the muffin pan in a second pan or skillet containing 1" of boiling water. Carefully break an egg into each of the muffin pan compartments. Dust with salt and a smougen of white pepper. Cover with a lid or with aluminum foil. Poach (boil, four to five min., or until the eggs are firm. Let stand over hot water until ready to serve. To remove, loosen eggs at the edges, then lift out with a tablespoon.

MISSING FROM BOAT Jakarta (Reuters) - Twenty Indonesian students are missing after their junk sank on a voyage to an island in the lesser Sunda group, the official Antara news agency reported Saturday. MENACED BY CHOLERA KARACHI (Reuters) - Disastrous floods in Pakistan have brought a threat of cholera, with several suspected cases reported in Lahore after an invasion of flies and mosquitoes. Three big East Pakistan rivers, the Sanghu, the Matamuhri and the Halda, are on a monsoon rampage in the Chittagong region, now being flooded for the second time within a few weeks.
