The Liquor Question

We hoped the summer months would have passed quietly away in the discussion of the scheme for furnishing Charlottetown with pure water...

The promoters of this attempt are, of course, acting solely in the interest of the public—at least, we are bound to assume that they are; and they will, no doubt, ere long, either by means of public meetings or the press, or both, give their reasons for the revocation which they desire.

In the meantime, we may be permitted to say that it seems a pity the attempt is to be tried before the Scott Act has received a fair trial, and before the electorate of the whole of Canada has passed upon the question of total prohibition.

Further, it seems wrong (does it not?) to legalize a public evil. Even those engaged in it are compelled to acknowledge that the liquor traffic is not in itself legitimate...

A most interesting feature of the number under notice was a correspondence between a Mr. Arthur W. Godfrey, of Halifax, N. S., and the Right Hon. Sir Robert Peel, London.
