**Communication Expert Is Known In Province**

Clarence A. Beckett, a New Brunswick born communications expert who rose through the ranks to become relief supervisor in Charlottetown and later manager of the Halifax operations of Canadian National Telecommunications, is retiring after more than 47 years service.

Mr. Beckett's colleagues and friends held a party in his honor at the Nova Scotian Hotel during the weekend.

Looking back over his lengthy career, Mr. Beckett recalls the dark days of the Second World War as the busiest and most exciting era.

"We often worked around the clock—often 36 hours at a stretch," he says. "During the early part of the war Halifax was a vital communications outpost. We handled all the military communications, and had to undergo periodic security checks because of the classified nature of much of the material we handled."

When the United States entered the war, Mr. Beckett was posted briefly to New York where he joined a group of specialists who established a communication network for the US military. CN and the Western Union Telegraph Company worked together on the project.

The period shortly after the war ended is etched in my mind forever," says Mr. Beckett. "One weekend the liner Queen Elizabeth brought some 17,000 troops home from Europe and the first place most of them headed was the telegraph office. We handled 40,000 messages that weekend. Most were short as I recall but they carried the most welcome news possible for thousands of families. 'Arrived Halifax safely, see you soon' was a typical message."

DEVELOPMENT ROLE  
However, despite his busy activities as automatic supervisor and chief operator during the latter part of the war and the post war days, Mr. Beckett somehow found time to play a large part in the early development of Armdale, the suburban Halifax community where he lives.

He served as chairman of the local school board for 15 years, during which time several new schools were built and existing ones expanded.

**Attendance Rises In Rural Schools**

A window was broken at Calbeck's store and some clothes and a small amount of change was taken from the cash register.

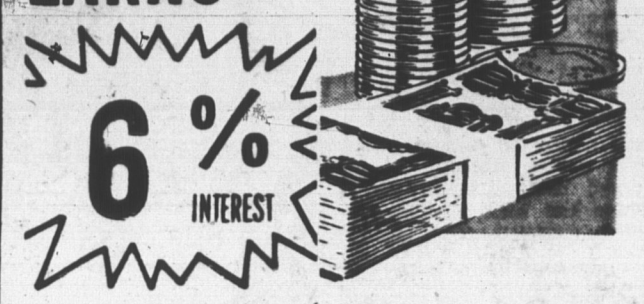
Break and entry was also made at Bowens's Store through a window and items of small value taken.
