## Lions Club Provide Medical Equipment



Pictured above is the presentation of the latest type electro-magnet, made last evening by the Charlottetown Lions Club to the medical profession of P. E. I. The first of its kind for use on the Island, the magnet is metal particles from the eye, an operation that up until now had to be done at points out of the Province where such equipment (extreme right) made the presentation on behalf of the Charlottetown Lions Club to Dr. J. P. Lantz (right center), chairman of the Medical Staff of the P. E. I. Island Hospital, and Mr. N. D. MacLean (left center), chairman of the Board of Trustees of the P. E. I. Hospital. King Lion Jack Stevenson, local Lions President (extreme left) was chairman of the presentation. The electro-magnet will be available to all doctors and hospitals in the Province requiring its services.

The Charlottetown Lions Club made their contribution to the pages of medical history in this Province last evening when they donated a special type electro-magnet, designed for the purpose of removing foreign metal particles from the eye, to the medical profession of P.E.I.

The presentation was made at their bi-monthly dinner meeting held at the Queen Hotel to Dr. J. P. Lantz, chairman of the medical staff of the P. E. I. Island Hospital, and Mr. N. D. MacLean, chairman of the board of trustees of the same hospital. The magnet is to be held in custody by the P. E. I. Hospital but will be available to all doctors or hospitals in the Province requiring its services.

Lion Dr. I. Rachmel made the presentation on behalf of the Lions Club.

On receiving the electro-magnet, the only one of its kind in the Province, Dr. Lantz congratulated the Charlottetown Lions Club "for all the fine things you have done for the blind people in this Province that I know about and the many other services rendered which the public has never heard about. I think you are hiding your talents under a bushel," he said, "and should publicize more the splendid work you are doing."

Dr. Lantz then explained the working principle of the electro-magnet in which he pointed out that the older type magnets used in the past were large, cumbersome equipment, which made such operations difficult whereas this new compact unit, coupled with a more advanced technique, simplifies such operations with much less risk of any further injury to the eye. He also pointed out that up until now, patients requiring such treatment in this Province, had to be sent to such distant points as Montreal, Halifax, etc., which will no longer be necessary, he stated, "and on behalf of the hospitals of this Province I wish to thank you."

Following the presentation, a short business meeting was held under the chairmanship of King Lion Jack Stevenson, in which reports were heard from the choicest and jack pot project committees from their respective chairmen, Lion Bill Warren and Lion Tom Edgett.

Mr. Gordon Prendergast of Montreal, attended as a guest of Lion John VanMaanen.

The meeting adjourned with the singing of "The Queen".

### LIGURIAN PLAYERS OUTSTANDING IN LADY OF FATIMA PRODUCTION

For nearly three hours last night in the Community Centre a large crowd sat in a silence so hushed a person could hear the proverbial pin drop as the Liguorian players presented their dramatic play "Lady of Fatima".

There was a suppers of drama in every one of the twelve scenes of the inspiring play. The scenes were short and each one was prefaced by pre-scene discussions.

The play, directed by Rev. John A. Gallagher, C.Ss.R., depicted the story of the apparitions of the Mother of God at Fatima, Portugal, in 1917. The Blessed Virgin appeared six times to three Portuguese children between the months of May and October.

Veteran stage critics classed last night's efforts by the Liguorian players among the best they had ever seen by amateur actors.

Each member of the large cast acted his or her part in a manner which evidenced long and diligent preparation in readiness for the play.

There was more than the acting and the drama of the play to draw the praise of the audience. A different scene background for each of the twelve scenes showed that no effort or idea had been spared in the attempt to make the play a success.

Shown in the play were a number of the apparitions of "Our Lady", including the final apparition on October 13 after which 70,000 believers and unbelievers witnessed the Miracle of the Sun. "Our Lady of Fatima" was played by Mary Moran. She was shown, in a flowing white veil, trimmed with gold, standing above the children and imparting to them the message of repentance, prayer and penance.

The final apparition along with the "Miracle of the Sun" was one of the most impressive parts of the play. It was followed by another equally impressive scene in the deathbed of Francisco, whose part was very capably taken by Harry Callaghan.

There was comedy in the play too, especially in the jail scene, which showed the children being cast into a cell with four unsavory characters whose parts were well played by John Walsh, Allan Shephard, Carl Proude and Everett Beagan.

Of equal importance with the acting were the pre-scene discussions by J. Pius Callaghan, Ivan Dowling, William Ledwell and Lorne Hennessey.

Mr. Callaghan played the role of a Portuguese merchant; Mr. Ledwell was a German priest; Mr. Dowling a French atheist; and Mr. Hennessey an American scientist. In round table discussions they provided the audience with background for proper appreciation of the play.

A total of 28 took an active part in the acting of the play. In addition there were eight others who did a tremendous amount of work in a short time preparing a different background for each scene.
