BERLIN, (AP) — Twenty West Berlin business men claim that the Big Four conference is ruining them.

The complainers have small business establishments in the area of the Allied control authority building, where the foreign ministers are meeting daily.

Germans are barred from the area. Thus passing trade is barred, and the little shops are empty.

West Berlin hotel owners Wednesday blamed Allied authorities for losing them business during the foreign ministers' conference.

Carl Zellermyer, chairman of the hotel and restaurant owners guild, said the West Berlin city government and Western Allied authorities reserved whole hotels in advance, then cancelled them 48 hours before the conference opened.

As a result, he said, every West Berlin hotel has dozens of empty rooms.
