

Former S'ide Resident Dies

Mr. Alexander Nicholson, a former resident of Summerside, died suddenly yesterday morning at the age of 44 years. Mr. Nicholson took suddenly ill on Saturday night at his home in Lakeburn and was taken to hospital in a coma about four o'clock Sunday morning but he never regained consciousness. Death is believed to have been from a cerebral hemorrhage.

Mr. Nicholson was born in Port Hill, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Nicholson. The family moved to Summerside about thirty-five years ago and Mr. Nicholson attended school there and remained until the outbreak of the war. He joined the army and served overseas for four years. After his discharge he was for a short time a member of the Unemployment Insurance Office in Summerside and later joined the Meteorological Service of the Department of Transport, with which he was still serving at the time of his death.

He is survived by his wife, the former Vera Clark of St. Croix, N.S., and by two brothers and five sisters. Ewen and Ivan of Summerside. Dorothy, Mrs. Urville Schurman, London, Ontario. 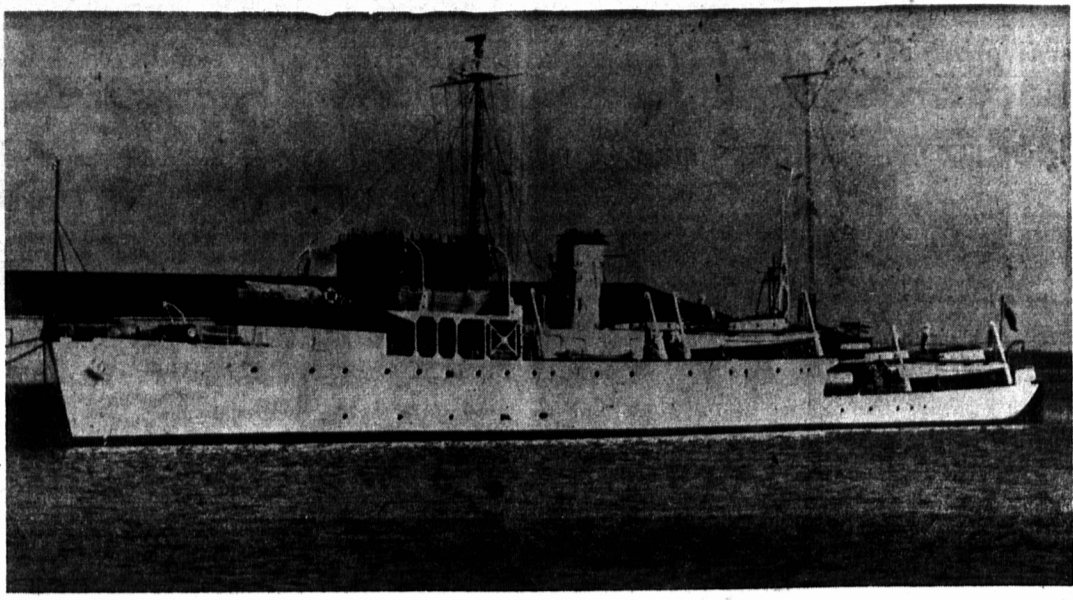

Special Equipment Will Be Used In Survey Of Gulf

In use for the first time in Canada, special electronic equipment aboard the C.G.S. Kapuskasing (above) in conjunction with similar equipment located in a shore station, which has been constructed at Park Corner, P. E. I., and another on the Magdalen Islands, will be used this summer in the making of marine charts of the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

This will bring up to date a survey that has not been made for about a century and will include areas of the Gulf that have never been previously sounded. The revised charts, when completed will be an aid primarily to navigation and also to fisheries. Previous to the introduction of this new electronic

equipment, accurate sounding and charting required visual contact between a ship or motor launch and two wooden markers on shore. This meant that water areas beyond the sight of land or hidden from the markers by fog could not be accurately charted in regard to soundings. Now, however, with the equipment known as the Decca navigator, the Kapuskasing becomes the third point of the electronic triangle with the Decca slave stations at Park Corner and on the Magdalen Islands, and will enable the hydrographers to make a complete and accurate marine charting survey with the transmission of sound impulses from the two slave stations pinpointing the exact position of the ship, which will, to-

gether with the depth of the water at that point, be recorded continuously on the new equipment. The Kapuskasing, under command of Captain R. E. Hanson, is seen above at Summerside where she unloaded several tons of equipment which was installed in the new Decca Navigator slave station at Park Corner, near Malpeque.

The ship, while working this summer in the Gulf of St. Lawrence will use the port of Souris as a base headquarters. 255 feet in length, and with a crew of 65, this ship which sparkles with cleanliness, carries 4 inshore sounding launches for working in shallow areas where the ship cannot go. PEI Delegates Impressed With Conference Results

Island delegates who attended the first National Highway Safety Conference held at Ottawa, May 24-26, sponsored by Canadian Road Builders Association expressed satisfaction with the events that transpired at the meeting, speaking on behalf of the delegates, Lt.-Col. Fielding, Deputy Provincial Secretary, reports as follows:

"At this conference Prince Edward Island was represented by eight delegates whose names have already appeared in the press. The chairman of the conference was the Hon. Brooke Claxton who was elected chairman of the continuing organization. Mr. Claxton's leadership was reflected in the enthusiasm and interest of all the more than 300 registered delegates.

"The conference was organized under two groups or divisions of committees. First, ten delegate divisions consisting of education, agriculture, business and industry, labor, public information, public officials, public transport, women's organizations, youth groups and organizations generally. The functional committee, of which there were five, namely engineering, enforcement, education, motor vehicle administration and public support, had within them representatives from most of the delegate divisions.

"After the delegate divisions met and discussed the general problem of the conference the functional committees took over and for two days discussed the problem of highway safety as it applied to each particular committee. At the end of these discussions the functional committees reported, first to the steering committee which had been set up previous to the calling of the conference, and then to a plenary session of the entire conference. Opportunity was given for discussion of each report as it was presented to the plenary session.

FINAL DAY
"On the final day the delegate divisions reported, chiefly in respect to recommendations as to the implementation of the reports submitted by the functional com-

mittees. The final act of the conference was the adoption of a resolution approving a continuing organization at the national level.

"The considered opinion of the entire P.E.I. delegation is that a conference of this kind, bringing together as it did delegates from all parts of Canada and from various organizations and groups concerned in the problem of Highway Safety, was a history-making event in the matter of safety on the highways of Canada. The earnestness with which all delegates entered into the activities of the conference was indicative of the serious view taken by all in respect to the problem facing them.

"The delegation is unanimous in its opinion that such a conference focusing as it did the attention of all present, and indeed of the whole nation, on the vital necessity for consideration of this problem at a national level, and paving the way for similar interest at a provincial level, has made an outstanding contribution to the solution of the problem of Highway Safety."

Presbyterian Official Wants To Quit Post

TORONTO, (CP)—Dr. A. Neel Miller of Toronto, secretary of the stewardship and budget committee of the Presbyterian Church said Monday he wants to resign because his present office curtails his freedom of speech.

He said he feels he could contribute more to the church as a pastor.

Dr. Miller who has served on the committee for seven years, made the statement before the 81st general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Rev. David Lane of Clinton demanded an explanation of Dr. Miller's resignation bid.

"I think assembly members should know if it is Dr. Miller's personal desire to resign," he said, "or if pressure from within the church and interference with his office have driven him to it."

Moderator Dr. Walter T. McCree did not call on Dr. Miller for an explanation. He appointed a committee to look into the matter and to report to the assembly later in the week.

Formation of a nationally-organized Presbyterian men's group was approved by the assembly. Men's organizations in the church up to now have functioned on a local level and have never been constituted.

Six Medals Awarded By Royal Society Of Canada

TORONTO, (CP)—The Royal Society of Canada Monday night awarded medals to six Canadians for distinguished literary and scientific achievement.

Dr. Jean-Marie Gauvreau of Montreal was awarded the Pierre Chaveau medal, founded in Canadian literature. The medal is named in honor of the 19th century figure of the 19th century. The medal is awarded for Canadian literary production of a high order.

Bruce Hutchison of Victoria was awarded the Lorne Pierce medal for distinguished contribution to Canadian literature. The medal was endowed by Lorne Pierce of Toronto, former editor of the Ryerson press.

Col. Charles P. Stacey of Ottawa, official historian of the Canadian Army, was awarded the Tyrrell medal for outstanding contributions to the study of Canada. The medal was established by J. B. Tyrrell of Toronto.

Dr. E. W. R. Steacie, president of the National Research Council and of the Royal Society of Canada, was awarded the Henry Marshall Tory medal, named for the former president of NRC. The medal is awarded for outstanding achievement in chemistry or physics.

Winters Declares Public Works Economic Medicine For The Canadian Economy

TORONTO, (CP)—Works Minister Winters Monday night described public works projects as a "control valve and a stimulant" for the Canadian economy.

Though his department was responsible for only \$100,000,000 of the \$2,730,000,000 worth of commercial construction produced in 1954, "we can nevertheless act both as a control valve and stimulant by planning and implementing our work to best advantage," Mr. Winters said in a speech before the Canadian Welding Society.

The statement was contained in the text of his address released to the press in advance of delivery.

"The difference between firmness and slackness in the economic condition of an industry is not often very great, especially where utilization of tradesmen is concerned," he said.

ECONOMIC MEDICINE
Construction worth \$100,000,000 superimposed on an industry already working to capacity might cause "pressures harmful to the over-all economy, whereas \$100,000,000 worth of work added to the industry at a time when it tends to be a little slack might be just the kind of economic medicine required."

Therefore, "the department of public works... can be in a position to make the difference between full employment and slackness in industry."

Mr. Winters said his department is responsible for only about 40 per cent of government building, most of the remainder being constructed by the crown-owned Defence Construction Limited for the defence department and by the transport department.

Some of the best public works undertaken were joint federal-provincial projects.

WELCOME SUGGESTIONS
"We... welcome suggestions for co-operative projects from provincial governments who in turn often look for some measure of co-operation from their municipalities," he said.

Though there were "key gaps" to be closed, the Trans-Canada highway had proved federal and provincial governments could work together on national projects, but "not all the provincial governments have applied themselves as diligently to this important project as we would wish or as we had expected when they signed agreements to complete their portions by December, 1955."

I. and St. John's, Newfoundland will load cargo once a month at Summerside as a result of an agreement between the Department of Industry and Natural Resources and the Summerside Board of Trade. All products, except cattle will be accepted at Summerside including dairy products, canned goods, poultry hogs etc. The "Blue Prince" makes three round trips a month between the two provinces and according to the agreement will call at Summerside every third trip, the first of which is scheduled between the 25th and 30th of June. The present breakwater will be reinforced with sheet steel piling for a distance of 175 feet and the space below the deck of the breakwater will be rock fill.
