Alberton Couple Home From 2,500-Mile Voyage

Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Leavitt, Alberton, returned Monday, Sept. 24th after having completed a 2500 mile honeymoon cruise in their cream and white craft Liscombe II. They were married at St. Eleonor's in July.
Mr. Leavitt is a veteran of the Second World War having completed two tours of fighter bombardier operations while serving with the Royal Canadian Air Force overseas, winning the Distinguished Flying Medal on a famous raid over enemy territory and returned to Canada with the rank of Flying Officer. Ever since his school days he has been interested in boat building, both his father and his grandfather were fishermen and through the years constructed their own craft which plied around inland coasts. The Liscombe II was built over a two-year period and the model and the boat were designed and built by Mr. Leavitt himself under the watchful eye of a veteran boat builder, William Aubrey of Alberton South. It was the latter who inspired Mr. Leavitt and his bride to take the journey across Northumberland Strait and around the Gaspe Peninsula.
They started the trip July 10th. Leaving in the stillness of 4 A.M. passing Tignish, they rounded North Cape and had intended to cruise the Gaspe shore, but inclement weather obliged them to alter their course and they headed for Shippegan Gully. In a day they had covered the distance of eighty miles. They spent a few days with friends and then resumed their cruise.
Crossing Bay of Chaleur, they landed at Percé. Rough weather forced them to remain a few days before putting out again. The sail around Gaspe took them to Fox River, Grand Valley and Mount Louis. It was in this area they experienced the worst weather, and Mr. Leavitt commented that one day at the end of eight hours they had covered only eight miles.
Down the Saguenay to Chicoutimi the Leavitts continued. They had a week of sightseeing in Quebec, went to Soré and entered

Addresses Large Gathering

—Before an audience estimated at close to three hundred persons, which filled the beautiful and spacious O'Leary United Church of Canada to overflowing so that many guests had to be used, Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, K.C., M.P., of Summerside, Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, gave a most interesting, instructive and educational account of his trip, with several other Canadian Parliamentarians to the Dominions of New Zealand and Australia last December.
The fine address was illustrated by a beautiful film of the two great Dominions taken on the tour. There was also a short film "Prince Edward Island" by the National Film Board shown. The projector was operated by George Bernard O'Leary. The lecture and films were sponsored by the O'Leary United Church Young People's Union.
The Minister, Rev. Warren G. Dickson, presided and led in a short worship service. He very cordially welcomed the large audience and the guest speaker who is well known in O'Leary and vicinity. Mr. MacNaught taught school in O'Leary and has always taken a great interest in church work and anything that pertained to the betterment of the community. During the devotions prayer was offered by Mr. Owen Underwood, Minister of the O'Leary Nazarene Church.
Mr. MacNaught stated that he and his colleagues in the delegation which represented different political parties, left on November 9th, 1950 and he returned to Summerside two days before Christmas. They first journeyed to Vancouver, then to San Francisco, thence to Honolulu, which is the capital of the beautiful Hawaiian Islands. After Honolulu the group went to Canton Islands, to the Fiji Islands, and then to New Zealand and Australia.
Mr. MacNaught devoted the major portion of his fine address to New Zealand. He mentioned the fact that the two large islands—North and South Islands, and several smaller islands which comprise New Zealand are very beautiful. He spoke about the friendliness of the people, the gorgeous flowers and plants, the marvellous grazing lands. He said that the economy of New Zealand depended on the grass. One great difference between New Zealand and P.E.I. is that the cattle and the sheep, which he said numbered thirty two million, did not need to be put in barns at all as we have to do here, because the weather and climate in New Zealand is very mild.
Touching briefly on Australia, Mr. MacNaught told something of that great Dominion and continent. He spoke about and showed in the film, the principal cities of Sydney and Melbourne. There were several fine pictures of the beautiful Sydney Bridge. He mentioned one very striking fact as compared to Canada which was, that the different states that comprise Australia all have a different railway gauge, whereas in Canada there's a standard railway gauge for our whole nation.
The meeting closed with the Mizpah Benediction. — OZ.

Death In Windsor Of Mrs. H.A. Graybiel

WINDSOR, Ont., Sept. 25 — (CP) — Mrs. Hugh A. Graybiel, wife of the president of the Windsor Star, died in hospital here Monday, Mrs. Graybiel, who was recovering from a severe illness, suffered a heart attack last Sunday. She had been ill two weeks.
The former Alice Wilson, she was the daughter of the late Manuel Wilson and Helen Freeman Wilson of Caledonia, Mich. She was born and received her early education in that town.
In 1913 following her marriage she moved with Mr. Graybiel to Saskatchewan, where they homesteaded near Saskatoon prior to Mr. Graybiel's entering newspaper work with the old Saskatoon Star. They moved to Windsor in 1918.
A graduate of Northwestern University at Evanston, Ill., where she was a student in the School of Speech, Mrs. Graybiel toured much of the United States as a reader and violinist with the Chicago Ladies Orchestra. She continued her interest in music in her late years when she was a member and past president of the Music, Literature and Art Club, Windsor's oldest literary club.
Besides her husband, she is survived by one son, Richard A. Graybiel, and two grandchildren, Kim, 3, and Janet, 2. A second son, Hugh Manuel, born in 1916, died in 1917.
