Ring Reminiscences

— Fights and Fighters —

Heavy hitters, in boxing parlance, are those who have the ability to deliver a clean unimpeded punch anywhere above the diaphragm of their opponents where it will have the greatest effect. The "great middleweight, lightweight and heavyweight champion" Bob Fitzsimmons was probably the most outstanding example of that class. This gift of instantaneous action and reflexes is abysmal, primordial (so to speak). It is a throw-back to the jungle and cave dwelling days of primitive man. Humans are "fearfully and wonderfully" constructed—mentally and physically. Many men of profound erudition, apostles and expounders of our Christian way of life, get an all pervading thrill in watching a physical contest between two gladiators, or even hearing a radio description. It's hard to fathom the physical urge in humans. It must have been transmitted through countless generations since the "survival of the fittest" was the moral law.

Thousands of big active longshoremen and lumberjacks—people in all walks of life can strike a heavier punch than champion boxers, but they can't get a chance to land their potential sleep producers. There are many reasons; they must engage in many contests in order to build up a reputation. When they get to the top circle and are matched with the champion, they are the least bit slower, almost imperceptibly slower. The champ beats them to the punch, and strength and hitting power are nullified by the faster champ. It is surprising the small margin in quickness which makes the winner look far superior to the loser.

I saw Billy McKinnon in what was his first entry in the "squared circle", in the B.A.A. amateur boxing contests in Mechanics building, Boston. As fate would have it Bill drew lots with Fred Bradley, another Islander from St. Theresa's. The amateurs are limited to three rounds and they waste no time. They generally throw discretion and ring tactics to the winds and simply slug as hard as they can. There is far more blood and battery seen in amateur bouts than in highly touted professional bouts, where sometimes they are so cagey and scientific that not a drop of blood is lost, or even one knockdown occurs. They are so careful and canny that neither will open up. They "carry" one another through no word is spoken arranging a "fix".

There was a little episode which transpired while I was attending P.W.C. in 1897. It concerns George Byers, whom I met at Sam Langford's training camp at Northboro, Mass., eleven years later. It will give some idea of the nerve and self-assurance of the youth who a few years later was one of the topnotch middleweight boxers in America. Four other P.W.C. boys and I boarded and roomed at 93 Kent Street. Three of them, viz: Emmanuel and Wilfred Gaudet and Peter D. McDonald are gone from this life to the life beyond. Plus McLellan is now a priest of the Jesuit Order in Winnipeg, Man. We were used to attending prayers and benediction in the old Cathedral—seated in the gallery. Decorum was stricter in church congregations in those days than at present—more's the pity. To smile, or whisper was almost a sacrilege. However, one of the boys saw something which tickled his vein of humor, and he indulged in one of those subdued belly laughs which appeared uncontrollable. The strangest thing about it was that he was the most religious and God-fearing among us. From the poorer lighted seats in the rear a young coloured fellow stepped up fast, caught the hilarious one by the shoulder and said in a tense tone of voice, "Cut that out young fellow, or I'll give you a lift under the chin." Needless to say the giggling stopped quickly. It was an object lesson in militant christianity and church manners. George Byers, the potential middleweight, was the bold youth.

Among other native born "Islanders" who attained fame in the boxing arena, were the late John M. Ahearn of Tignish. The Doyle brothers (sons of Joe Doyle, Campbellton, Lot 4) distinguished themselves in wrestling rings through the New England States. There was also a Gallant boy (lightweight) from Bloomfield or Plusville. Jim Kennedy from some part of King's County ran a boxing school on Dover Street in Boston. Jack Grant, brother of Hon.

Plague Area In Alberta Enlarging

EDMONTON, May 21—(CP)—Entomologist J. H. Brown of Alberta's Health Department says the boundaries of the Province's Bubonic plague areas are slowly reaching for the populated centres.

In turn, the areas more heavily settled are themselves slowly being extended toward the relatively isolated danger areas. Mr. Brown said in an interview that is one reason why Alberta, at present free of rats, is striving to keep them out. Rats conceivably could sweep the diseases to the populated areas with terrible results. But he said the spread is gradual now.

Now, as in the past, there is no known cure for Bubonic plague—the "Black Death" of history books. Alberta's infected area of roughly 2,700 square miles is the largest in North America east of the Rocky Mountains. That there have been no deaths reported is due to the scattered population, Mr. Brown said.

But the disease is there, carried by ticks and fleas, and in turn by gophers and other rodents, in an area roughly 80 miles east of Calgary, 40 miles north of Lethbridge and about 60 miles west of the flanking Saskatchewan border.

The disease spreads as the carrier animals travel and transmit the infected ticks and fleas. Mr. Brown said that tests, just resumed for the summer by two university students travelling in a laboratory truck, likely will show the 1951 evidences of both plague and fever increased and extended.
