Canada Develops Business In Raw Plastics In Far East

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada is developing a small but growing business in plastics materials in the Far East.

The Asian trade consists mainly of raw materials going to several countries that are engaged in building up their plastics manufacturing industries.

The market now stands at about \$2,000,000 a year, says the current issue of Foreign Trade, publication of the federal trade department.

"This market should increase with the growth of industry in these countries, where development plans favor plastics production and mean greater demand for imported plastic raw materials," the magazine says.

Canada's chief export in this field is polystyrene, a by-product of oil refining produced in Sarnia, Ont. This is a versatile product used in making a variety of articles ranging from cheap toys to refrigerator linings.

Another sizeable market is Japan, which took \$296,000 worth in 1955. Heavy demands of Japan's plastics industry will result in continued imports, the department says, though Japan may reach her goal of self-sufficiency in plastic raw materials in a few years.

Scattered markets also are available in some other Far Eastern countries, though several of them are hampered in their buying by currency shortages.

Canada's sales to Indonesia are rising and could expand, sharply with the availability of foreign exchange.

N. Y. Stocks Make Large Weekly Advance

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market last week made its greatest advance on average in 18 years.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose \$6.40 to \$181.60, its best level since Nov. 5.

The market was up on average in four of the week's five trading sessions and the only decline was a slight one.

On top of a good technical condition of the market there were a number of optimistic trends in the international situation.

The daily trading average of 2,257,193 shares was the highest since the week of the U. S. presidential election.

Ontario Sends Representatives To Austria

VIENNA (CP)—Representatives of the Ontario government arrived in Vienna Wednesday to survey the Hungarian refugee problem.

John Yaremko, Progressive Conservative member of the Ontario legislature for Bellwoods-Toronto, said he expects to spend three days checking aspects of particular interest to Ontario. He was commissioned by the Ontario government to make a survey of their refugee situation.

Yaremko was accompanied by Ontario agent-general J. S. P. Armstrong, who visited Vienna last week, and Joseph Bottlik, official representative of the Toronto Hungarian Society.

Shortly after they arrived, a Trans-Canada Air Lines plane took off from here for Toronto with 67 refugees, including 40 children. It was the first flight direct to Toronto.

PROCESS 400 A DAY
Yaremko spoke to the group at the airport.

Earlier, the Ontario group had

an interview with federal Immigration Minister John Pickerskill. Armstrong said he didn't "envisage" that it would be necessary for Ontario to make independent transportation arrangements.

Meanwhile, Canadian immigration officials reported that visa work was completed for all 250 refugees scheduled to sail Saturday aboard the liner New York.

The Canadian immigration staff, now processing 400 visa applications daily, said an additional 350 refugees are being flown to England. They are proceeding to Canada Saturday aboard the Empress of Britain. Another 120 are scheduled to sail aboard the Cunard liner Invernia from Le Havre, France, Friday.

BULGARIANS KILLED
ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP)—The Istanbul newspaper Milliyet said Friday several Bulgarians were killed and others arrested during clashes between demonstrators and police in a number of communities in neighboring Bulgaria.

The paper said fighting took place Thursday and that Sofia radio announced an "uprising" had been quelled.
