FOR SYDNEY.—The Elliot left yesterday afternoon for Sydney. Her cargo consisted of 10 bbls of pork, 200 bales of hay, 105 cases eggs, 75 bbls vegetable, 4,700 feet of lumber, 85 bags potatoes, 2 horses, 32 head cattle, besides a large quantity of sundries, making almost a full cargo. The Elliot will sail from Charlottetown on Thursdays arriving in Sydney twenty-four hours later.
