Black Hawks And Red Wings In Player Trade

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago Black Hawks and world champion Detroit Red Wings Saturday completed an exchange involving eight players in the year's biggest National Hockey League trade.

Chicago obtained four defensemen in the straight swap: defenseman Benny Witt and forwards Glen Skov, Tony Leswick and Johnny Wilson.

The Hawks sent to Detroit defenseman Gordon Hollingsworth and forwards Dave Creighton, John McCormack and Jerry Toppazzini.

"It is a very advantageous deal," said Jim Norris, Black Hawks owner. "We didn't give away any of our better players, but acquired a sound defenseman and three forwards who are not only good checkers but scorers as well."

Norris considers Witt one of the toughest defensemen in the business.

"He's 26 and weighs 195 pounds," said Norris. "He is a hard hitting ice man." He has been in the big time four full seasons and has netted 62 goals and 60 assists although being continually used as the Wings' No. 1 defensive centre.

Leswick, 32, is a veteran of nine seasons in the league and rates as one of the best penalty-killing forwards in the game today.

Wilson, 25, has scored 52 goals and 51 assists in his last three seasons. With the Hawks he will team with his younger brother, Larry, to reunite the only brother combination now performing in the league.

Quebec And Chicoutimi Hockey Clubs Planning To Suspend Operations

MONTREAL (CP)—The Quebec Hockey League at its annual meeting Saturday granted the request of the Quebec and Chicoutimi clubs to suspend operations for the 1955-56 season.

The meeting adjourned until June 29 at which time, it was stated, the composition of the league will be definitely decided.

It is believed that should the situation regarding Quebec and Chicoutimi change during the interim, withdrawal of the requests for suspending operations would be favorably considered.

Following the closed meeting, it was announced that three cities, which were not named, have indicated interest in entering the minor professional loop.

STYMIED BY LATE PLAY

The 30-day adjournment came on motion of the Shawinigan Falls club. General manager, Kenny Reardon, said the club has been unable because of late play, to complete all financial and other official reports so all league business could be wound up at Saturday's meeting. The Edinburgh Trophy series between the victorious Shawinigan Falls Cataracts and Edmonton Flyers of the Western Hockey League extended into May.

Quebec representatives asked to withdraw from the circuit because of failure to come to an agreement with city authorities for continued use of the city-owned Coliseum. They said it would be impossible to operate under financial terms demanded by the city.

General manager George Imlach of Quebec Aces said he has already had offers for his players in wholesale lots.

The difficulties of the Chicoutimi club have been lack of attendance and public support, and general manager Rollie Hebert said the request to suspend operations was his only immediate recourse.

MAY RE-ENTER LEAGUE

A possibility that Ottawa Senators might re-enter the league under Eddie Shore was seen. The former National Hockey League star, who for years has operated largely in the American Hockey League, was present at the meeting.

It was reliably reported that Shore is willing to put a team in Ottawa if the Cantor interests, who have taken over the Auditorium there, don't go into hockey.

The franchise of the Ottawa Senators reverted to the league when owner Tommy Gorman called it quits in the middle of last season, steadily and blamed his predicament largely on television of NHL games into the Ottawa area.

When the NHL owners met in Toronto last week, steps were taken towards helping minor circuits through TV blackouts.

Beliveau Got \$20,000 Last Amateur Season

MONTREAL (CP)—If you want to do a little off-season speculation about the hockey salary of Jean Beliveau, start out with this: He got \$20,000 in his last season as an amateur.

That's the figure—the contract figure—given by George Imlach, general manager of Quebec Aces of the Quebec Senior Hockey League. George should know because he had the big centre-ice star of Montreal Canadiens under his wing when the circuit was amateur—the Quebec Senior Hockey League.

"He was worth it because of the attendance he dragged in, and there's no secret about it now," said Imlach during a fanning session following the QHL's annual meeting Saturday.

Nobody would give authoritatively Beliveau's present salary in the National Hockey League, but the consensus was this: Big Jean's five-year contract with Canadiens will enrich him by \$100,000, including a bonus figure spread out over the five years. Actual figures for salary and bonus were not indicated.

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Cubs Continue To Roll; Brooklyn Trims Giants Twice; Yankees And Indians Win

Chicago Cubs continued to show skeptics they're no early spring glories by racking up their 13th victory in the last 17 games with a 9-6 triumph over Milwaukee Braves Sunday.

While the victory did not reduce Brooklyn's six-game margin, it did increase the Cub's second-place lead over New York Giants to three games when the Dodgers whipped the Giants 8-5.

Milwaukee dropped to fifth place, one percentage point over Cincinnati, when St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Reds 7-2 to vault two places into fourth. The advancing Philadelphia Phillies captured their seventh in a row as Robin Roberts turned back Pittsburgh 5-2 in the first game of a doubleheader. The Pennsylvania curfew halted the second game with the Pirates leading 8-3 after 6½ innings.

The top three teams in the American League continued their successes as New York Yankees nipped Baltimore 1-0, Cleveland defeated Kansas City 4-2 and Chicago thrashed Detroit 9-3. Boston Red Sox ousted Washington from fifth place with a 12-7 victory over the Nats.

BLASTS LONG ONE

Larry Doby blasted a 500-foot home run to help Herb Score win his fifth game for Cleveland. Score needed help, however, in the ninth when four singles gave the Athletics one run with one out. Relief pitcher Ray Narjeski struck out Gene Zernial and Don Mossi fanned pinch hitter Elmer Valo to end the game.

Mike Fornieles scattered nine hits to post his fourth victory for the White Sox, three of them over Detroit. Jim Rivera drove in two runs with a home run and scored three. Ned Garver lost his seventh decision.

Jickie Jensen batted in four runs with a pair of homers and a single and Ted Williams cracked a double and triple as the Red Sox outslug the Senators. The Nats c-lecled 17 hits to 14 for Boston.

New York Giants came up with two home runs, a triple play and two double plays Saturday but still lost 5-3 to their arch-rivals, the National League-leading Brooklyn Dodgers. Gil Hodges' homer with two on base in the first inning did most of the damage for Brooklyn.

EXTEND STREAK

Philadelphia stretched their winning streak to six straight, downing Pittsburgh 8-4 in 11 innings. With two out and the score tied 4-4 in the bottom of the 10th, Pittsburgh scored what should have been the winning run, but lost the tally when baserunner Gene Freese stopped to congratulate teammate Ramon Mejias and was forced out at second.

In other National League games Chicago Sox defeated Milwaukee 5-2 and Cincinnati marked Harry (the Hat) Walker's debut as manager of St. Louis with a 5-1 win over the Cards. Walker replaced Eddie Stanky, fired earlier in the day.

Every player in the Chicago White Sox lineup, except pitcher Virgil Trucks, got at least one hit and scored at least once as Chicago piled up 19 hits to rout Detroit 16-4 in the American League.

Hungarian, Two Britons Run Mile Less Than 4 Minutes

LONDON (AP)—An obscure Hungarian with a stomach ache sped a mile in three minutes, 59 seconds Saturday and pulled his two closest rivals across the finish line in less than four minutes—the world's first 1-2-3 in less than four minutes.

A little more than a year ago the four-minute mile was a hope, an aim, a goal. It had been an impossibility since the day man began racing the clock. Then in May of 1954 came Dr. Roger Bannister, the first to cross the barrier.

He was followed by John Landy, who dropped the mark to 3:58. Saturday it was Laslo Tabari, 24, just out of the Hungarian Army and who never had won an international race.

BANNISTER GREETED TABORI

Tabori was followed by Chris Chataway, 24, British brewer and non-vivand who didn't think he was in condition. Time, 3:59.8. Almost even with Chataway was Brian Hewson, 23, Royal Air Force bomb-ardier and actually a half mile, 3:58.4. A little later he also was runner to Landy in Turku, Finland when the Australian teacher set the 3:58 world mark. He was not in the race when Bannister defeated Landy in the Vancouver United States Interscholastic outdoor track and field record.

That day the winner did 3:58.8 and Landy 3:59.6.

Among the 25,000 spectators Saturday at White City Stadium was Bannister. He was one of the first to greet Tabari after the race.

The chilled crowd apparently hadn't expected anything so remarkable as Saturday's shattering mile. Announcement of the times— one after the other—came as a stunning blow.

LANSBURG DID IT

They had been more moved by the thrilling race and Tabari's dogged efforts to take the lead on the last lap. After a pacemaker, Alan Gordon of Oxford, had carried the trip past a 66-second 440, a 2:00.8 half mile, he faded.

Hewson, in excellent condition in this his first real season as a miler, took over with Chataway and Tabari on his heels.

Tabari—he never had won an important race in his life and wasn't good enough to make the Hungarian team in last year's European Games—put on a spurt 250 yards from the finish. Chataway also spurred immediately. Later, he said this was his mistake.

Hewson and Chataway held the lead but as they came into the home stretch there was no holding Tabari. He just forged forward until winning by four or five yards. Chataway nipped Hewson by inches.

Bannister said he now felt many athletes would run faster than four minutes—"but it will never be easy." He said the absence of wind made conditions ideal for the sensational race. The track, although dampened by 24 hours of rains, is an all-weather one and built to absorb moisture. The temperature was 50.

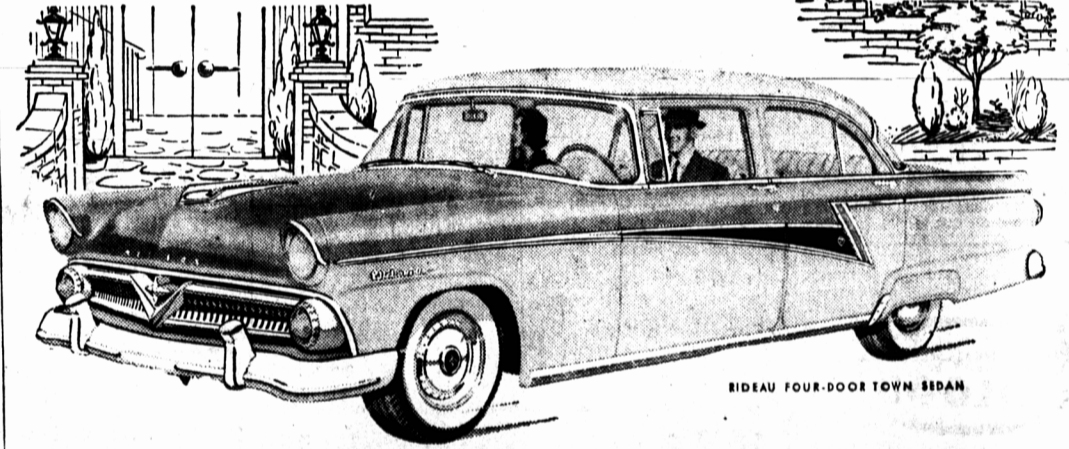
Matta, who stands 5 feet 11 and weighs 178, will join the Braves' Northern League farm club at Eau Claire June 20.
