Local and Other Items.

LOBSTER FISHING.—Sir Louis Davies has decided on December 15th as the commencement of the open season for lobster fishing in Western Nova Scotia and the Bay of Fundy.

BOYS WANTED.—Boys are making more trouble for a smart boy to make a fair amount of pocket-money each evening. Boys should be on hand at the office each afternoon at four o'clock.

SCOTT ACT.—The Scott is in force in twenty-eight counties in the Dominion, chiefly in the maritime provinces. In Westmorland County, N. B., an election for its repeal takes place on the 25th instant. The opponents of the Act count on a victory.

DISASTERS TO SHIPPING.—Reports of shipping disasters on the Newfoundland coast continue to arrive, showing considerable loss of life during the recent gales. The schooners Josephine, Pet, Minchaha, Emeline and Clara Belle are ashore at different points along the coast, and the schooner Marianne is now known to have foundered with a crew of six men.

QUEBEC VOLUNTEERS INSURED.—A Montreal despatch says that by an arrangement with the London and Lancashire, the Standard and British Assurance companies, each married man with the Quebec company going to South Africa carries additional \$500 on their lives. After the announcement that the Government did not intend to insure the men, a fund was started by patriotic people of Quebec, and the deal has just been closed.

ANOTHER MISTAKE.—An Ottawa despatch says: The Government now admits it was wrong in sending a military force to the Yukon, a proceeding which the Opposition has criticized with much vigor. Three-quarters of the force were withdrawn in the early part of the summer, then Colonel Evans is transferred to Toronto, and now today's orders are that Major Bliss, Costigan's son-in-law, is to report to headquarters as soon as possible. When the accounts of the military occupation of the Yukon are all in it will be found that the cost will foot up well into two millions.
