Elwood Irwin of Baren, Alberta, was elected president of the Canadian Seed Growers Association which concluded its annual convention in Charlottetown Friday.

Agriculture Minister Harry Hays of Ottawa was again named honorary president, and Gordon South of Whitome, Sask., is the immediate past president. The vice president is Dr. Harold R. Klink of MacDonald College, St. Anne de Bellevue.

IRRIGATED. By 1962 the figure was up to 29 million acres, which indicated the rate of progress the Russians have been making in this method of improved farming in dry weather, which has gained unprecedented interest here this year.

The temperature in Russia is said to be slightly warmer and more evenly distributed than in Canada, which is shown by the great variety of crops the people produce there. They have a longer and warmer growing season though their July is roughly comparable to ours, Dr. Wright said.

MECHANIZATION. They are pushing ahead with mechanization. They had 1.3 million tractors and one-half million grain combines a few years ago. By the end of this year they plan to have another million tractors and an additional 400,000 combines, he reported.

The huge country spreads half way across the world and through 11 time zones. This compares with five time zones in Canada, Dr. Wright noted.

Some 100 million acres of virgin and long fallowed land have been brought under the plow since 1954.

Under a system of state and collective farms there are 8,000 state farms with a total of 638 million acres and 41,000 collective farms with a total of 650 million acres.

Dr. Wright was speaking on "A look at some of the agriculture in the U.S.S.R. and Roumania."

Three Arraigned On Theft Charge

Joseph Bryon Gallant, Richard Darrell Casford and Malcolm Leith MacPherson all appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. in Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday afternoon each charged with theft valued at more than \$50. The charges were laid, as a result of the same incident, by Ralph Cox, also of Charlottetown.

Mr. MacQuaid appeared for Gallant and Casford and asked for an adjournment to better acquaint himself with the circumstances of the charge. Both were remanded until July 12 and bail was set at \$1,000 to be made up of two sureties of \$500 for both of the accused.

MacPherson was defended by John Holmes and he too asked for an adjournment. MacPherson was remanded until July 12 with the same provisions for bail.

Casford also appeared on a charge of driving while his license to operate a motor vehicle was suspended and he was fined \$50 and costs or 15 days.

DISAGREEMENT ENSUES. An argument between Mr. MacQuaid and the magistrate occurred after the sentences had been passed when Mr. Johnston would not grant Casford time to pay the fine.

Mr. MacQuaid pointed out "every other bum that comes in here gets two weeks to pay."

Mr. Johnston said if the Crown agrees then he would grant the two weeks. Cst. Maynard Roy of the RCMP, who was prosecuting the case for the Crown in the absence of Crown Prosecutor Alan Scales, said that he wouldn't go along with giving the accused time to pay as he had known the accused for some time and had never known him to work.

As a discussion ensued it was revealed that Casford had the money to pay the fine at home, the Crown pointed out that if this was the case a phone call to have someone bring the money to the jail would secure the release of Casford.

Water Safety, Swim Tests Start Monday

GEORGETOWN - The annual Red Cross swimming and water safety course, which commenced in Georgetown, July 1, is now nearing completion and the instructors, Kathleen Scully of Charlottetown and Judy Boudreau of Georgetown, will hold the tests for the beginners on Monday.

On Tuesday the various other classes will be tested by Bernard Callaghan of Charlottetown.

There are 54 children taking the beginners course; 15 taking junior classes; 12 taking intermediate; two taking intermediate bronze; five in the senior class and five are taking the bronze medal course.

Beginners and the juniors are being held at the ferry wharf shore, while the other classes are being conducted at the Queen's Wharf.

The instructions start at 10 a.m. and continue through until 2:30 in the afternoon. The Georgetown Home and School Association is again sponsoring.

Lions Club Starts Work In Preparing Park Site

GEORGETOWN - The local Lions Club recently discussed reclaiming an area on the west side of the town which has a good beach fronting it and it was decided that the Club would undertake the job of cleaning up the site and making it into a park.

The Club obtained the permission of the town council to go ahead with the work and on Tuesday and Wednesday nights of this week a start was made on this project when a large number of members, assisted by a number of interested citizens, gathered with tractors and a truck and went to work.

First the area had to be cleared of a large quantity of old timbers, which were placed there several years ago, at the time the new railway wharf was constructed. This phase is now nearly completed, and the enormous quantity of old timber had been hauled to a point along the harbor bank that was eating dangerously close in to the road as yearly erosion took its toll.

This timber will form a rip rap, over which clay fill will be eventually placed. It is estimated that one more night's work will clear this phase of the operations. It will then be necessary to clear the area of bushes, and while so doing try to preserve some of the nicer trees that are now growing there. The area will have to be leveled with a bulldozer and eventually seeded out.

The area extends from the foot of Richmond Street, along the shore to Monture Avenue. This whole area is fronted by the beach, safe for swimming, and picnic tables and barbecues could be installed. With Georgetown becoming industrialized and areas once available for swimming and picnicking along its shoreline now being utilized for commercial purposes, the necessity of developing this particular area has been emphasized and the Lions Club has said assistance will be appreciated from all who wish to co-operate in this community betterment project.
