Briefly here are some of the points: Mrs. Wilkie said how happy they were to be entertaining the members of FWIC board at this the 46th annual convention and honored to have the president of the vast organization, Mrs. Keith Rand.

She expressed appreciation to the Hon. Mr. Cullen, minister of agriculture, for his splendid cooperation, the W.I. office staff, press, radio and T.V.

The members of the board and institute members had made work a pleasure and a privilege. Sympathy was expressed to those who had lost loved ones and appreciation given for the W.I. radio broadcasts. Resolutions which have been repeatedly placed before the government from the Women's Institutes have been instrumental in the decision of the government to erect a dormitory for Prince of Wales College.

The W.I. building at the exhibition will be improved. Tribute was paid to the Handicraft Van. Mrs. William Alyward resigned as convener of United Nations and Letter Friends. Mrs. Robert Woodside was then appointed.

Four courses were held for presidents and secretaries. Contests sponsored during the past year were for "Words and Melody of Women's Institute Song", and the competition for quilt blocks as outlined in Tweedsmuir competition.

A Memorial Book has been purchased in which the names of all deceased members will be inscribed. Progress is being made in compiling a cook book. Group memberships have been taken in music and drama festivals. Support will be given to the recreation centre for retarded children being established at Oyster Bed Bridge.

It is to be hoped that the convener of citizenship will be able to attend Canadian Citizenship ceremonies. A bench, with the provincial coat of arms, was purchased for the Peace Garden. A wreath was placed on the Cen-

otaph on Memorial Day. Mr. John Martin of the National Film Board, will show films chosen by the W.I.
