### Estes Associates Get Prison Terms

EL PASO, Tex. (AP)—Three associates of Texas promoter Billie Sol Estes were sentenced to from six to 25 years in prison Thursday on pleas of guilty to mail fraud and conspiracy.

Those sentenced were Harold E. Orr, 31, and Ruel W. Alexander, 36, of Amarillo and Coleman McSpadden, 45, of Lubbock, all officials of the Superior Manufacturing Company of Amarillo.

McSpadden and Orr drew maximum sentences of 25 years. Alexander drew a sentence of more than six years.

Federal Judge R. E. Thomson, however, set the sentences on five counts to run concurrently, which means McSpadden and Orr would serve a maximum time of 10 years and Alexander six years.

No fines were assessed the officials but Superior Manufacturing Company drew \$1,000 fines on five counts for a total of \$5,000.

The indictment, also naming Estes, charged the four men lured farmers to sign mortgages on fertilizer tanks which never existed and sold the mortgages to various finance companies. Estes has pleaded not guilty.

### CCC Ousts Move On Bilingualism

VANCOUVER (CP)—A motion on bilingualism, which has survived heated debate in policy committee, was rejected Wednesday by the full membership of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce as it wound up its three-day, 33rd annual convention.

The recommendation, voted down 85-44, had urged that: "A program be instituted which would provide, over a stated period of time, that all deputy ministers be fluently bilingual with full consideration given to efficiency."

T. P. Fox of Westskwin, Alta., said such a recommendation—which, if passed, would have gone to the federal cabinet as chamber policy—would "discriminate against western Canada where students received no French instruction prior to high school."

"You can't achieve unity by compulsion," as French-Canada should know," he said.

### Freedomites Stay In Camp

PRINCETON, B.C. (CP)—British Columbia's Freedomite Doukhobors disregarded the advice of their lawyer Thursday and decided to stay encamped here rather than continue a march to the west.

"We are not going to march into police clubs," said Mrs. Fanny Storoff, spokesman for the 1,200 Freedomites. "We will stay."

The Freedomites were told Wednesday night by Vancouver lawyer George Herbrich that he felt they were within their rights to continue a trek from the Kootenays to the west.

### UC Salaries Increased

LONDON, Ont. (CP)—The United Church of Canada Thursday granted its ministers salary increase of \$150 a year for 1963 and another \$150 a year for 1964.

The increases will bring the minimum salary next year to \$3,500 plus travel allowance and to \$4,100 plus travel allowance the following year.

Rev. W. J. Baker of Grand Bank, Nfld., told the 20th general assembly, reporting they trapped a member on the increase would impose a hardship on churches in his part of the country.

The average annual wage in congregations in his province is about \$1,500, he said, compared to a minister's \$4,500, including travel allowance, earned by some ministers.

### Lawyer, Promoter Are Found Guilty

TORONTO (CP)—Lawyer John J. Bussin, 49, and former mining stock promoter Albert Gould, 46, were found guilty here of conspiring to defraud \$455,000 of Canada Developments Limited in 1957.

The Ontario Supreme Court jury deliberated six hours. Sentence will be passed Sept. 24.

Gould was convicted of fraud, forgery, 1959, and was sentenced to six years.

The trial involved a letter from Toronto, Cuba, in August, 1957, indicating sale of Middle East East Oil Corporation to Bahamas.

Twelve principles drafted by the board of evangelism and social service to guide church members in the observance of Sunday were accepted by council with a recommendation that they be published in pamphlet form.

Emphasizing the importance of homeliness, Sunday, the principles also stress the need for recreation and say physical and mental recreation are interrelated.

### STRESS TOGETHERNESS

"We believe in the preservation of a family unit where parents and children are together as a family. Any commercial interest, any sport, any amusement which threatens this, or constantly deprives families of this, is evil in its nature."

Council, which Monday passed eight of 18 main resolutions connected with a major church statement on marriage, agreed to the remaining statement Thursday. The report calls for a royal commission to consider revision of divorce law to include desertion, cruelty and insanity as grounds in addition to adultery.

A resolution declaring that "marriage for women should be open only to unmarried women or widows" and "therefore not subject to the null of widowhood" ran into heavy opposition and a barrage of amendments.

One amendment would permit women whose children have grown up to be reconsidered as long as her pastorate does not interfere with her wifely duties. The amendment in that form over strenuous protests from a minority.

## Youth Is Caught After Jail Escape

GEORGETOWN — Joseph Steele made his escape over the jail fence and his absence was noted almost immediately by later, L.S. Batchelder who reported it to the RCMP. 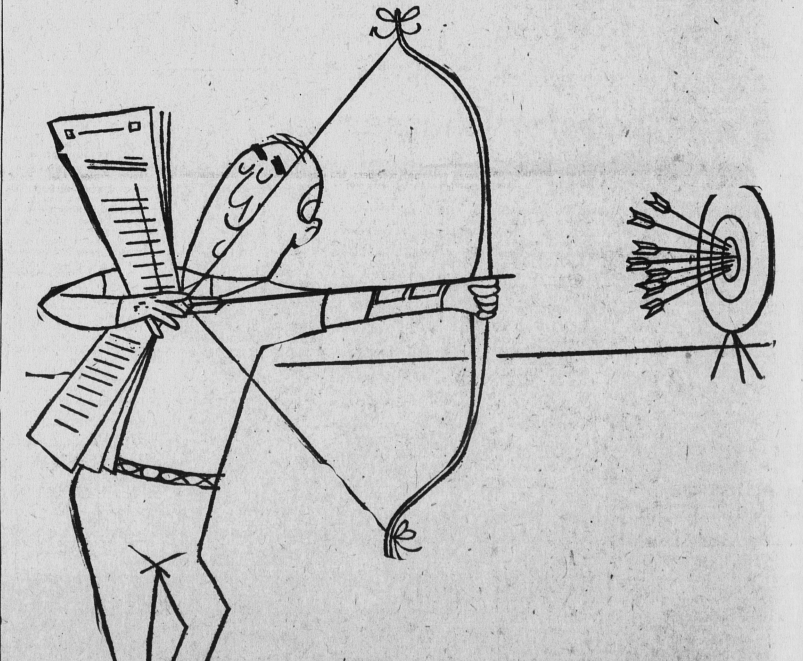
