HALIFAX, January 22 —Bringing to an end a railway career of more than 28 years service, sleeping car conductor H. E. Ellis, Canadian National Railways, 377 Connaught Avenue retires on January 31.

His retirement after faithful service with the company was announced here today by W. R. Sutherland, Regional Superintendent, Sleeping and Dining car department, here. Since he began his long railway career as a water in 1923, Henry Edward Ellis has continuously served travellers on Canadian National trains between Halifax, Sydney, Charlottetown, Saint John and Moncton and Montreal. He was promoted to Sleeping Car conductor in 1929.
