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LET'S EAT

Use Different Breads For Varied Sandwiches

I was telling the Chef, "A salad sandwich can look beautiful, taste delicious and provide a satisfying main course at supper or luncheon."

"It can also be a disappointment, Madame," he replied, "unless carefully made of ingredients that harmonize or actually taste good with bread."

PREPARED AHEAD
"If for immediate service, lettuce or sliced tomato or cucumbers may be added; but if the sandwiches are to be made ahead, the fresh vegetable must be added at the last minute. The lettuce may be used as a garnish either plain or fine-shredded."

"Bread for the salad sandwich should be sliced thin," he continued. "Crusts should be removed for party service, and reserved for bread crumbs, and both slices spread lightly with softened butter to form a coating, so that the moisture from the filling does not soak into the bread."

VARIETY OF BREADS
"Variety in bread that is used is also important. Special kinds are best for various types of sandwiches: enriched or specialty white bread for light-flavored salad fillings such as chicken, egg, crab or tuna; cheese bread or dark breads—not sweet—for smoked

glutamate and 1/4 tsp. pepper. Broil under a hot heat about 10 min., or until well-browned on each side.

Reduce the heat and continue to boil until fork-tender, about 6 min. longer. Garnish of lemon wedges and water dress.

TRICK OF THE CHEF
Add 1/4 tsp. dried thyme to French dressing used in brushing veal chops for broiling.
