The captain reports that he experienced a terrific gale during the run from Ferdinandina. One of the crew, a Halifax man, was drowned, and the captain himself had a narrow escape. The gale was one of the worst ever experienced by the captain. A big wave boarded the schooner and carried off the man at the wheel. He was seen for a moment on the crest of a wave and then disappeared forever. The same sea broke the boom and caught up the captain, who was on deck at the time. Captain Taylor grabbed a rope and saved himself. The captain omitted to give the name of the man who was lost.
