

'New Look' Toronto Argos Nip Als On Shatto Day

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Argonauts celebrated Dick Shatto Day with an exciting 24-21 victory over Montreal Alouettes as the last-place Argos made their final home stand of the Eastern Football Conference Saturday.

And Shatto had his own celebration, a touchdown and an all-around brilliant performance.

The 15-year veteran is pro football, a native of Springfield, Ohio, and now a Canadian citizen, scored his touchdown midway through the second quarter and returned to the field at half time to receive a shower of gifts in his final game in Toronto before retiring from the game at the end of this season.

He responded to the midfield half-time accolades with probably his finest game of the year. He gained 110 yards rushing and 21 yards on two passes from quarterback Peter Liske. Shatto was presented with the game ball by tackle Danny Nykoluk.

The victory was Toronto's second in 12 starts this season and the loss for the third-place Alouettes just about squelched any hopes they had of finishing the 14-game season in second place.

The Als, with two games left to play, are four points behind second-place Ottawa Rough Riders who have three more contests in their schedule.

Hustling Calgary Stamps Kill Eskies Playoff Hopes

CALGARY (CP) — Calgary Stampeders extinguished the play-off hopes of Edmonton Eskimos Saturday with a 28-19 win over Eskimos in a Western Football Conference game before 21,476 fans.

Defensive halfback Larry Robinson kicked two field goals and three converts to lead first-place Stamps, who already have clinched a play-off spot, to their 12th straight win over Eskimos in four seasons.

Eskimo end Tommy-Joe Coffey picked up 18 points on a convert and four field goals of 35, 28, 16 and 12 yards.

Stampeders held slim quarter leads of 8-7, 15-13 and 22-19.

Calgary quarterback Eagle Day passed for touchdowns to end Herman Harrison and flanker Bobby Taylor and halfback Ted Woods plunged over for another. Punter Jim Furlong booted a 46-yard single.

Fullback Jim Fauer got Edmonton's only touchdown.

The lead changed hands eight times in the hard-fought game and Stampeders tackle George Hansen was helped from the field with what was believed to be a cracked rib. Calgary tackle Don Luzzi and Eskimo flanker Randy Kerbow also were shaken up.

Calgary opened scoring in the first quarter on Furlong's 46-yard punt which caught Edmonton's Clarence Kachman, a recent addition, in his end zone. Kachman conceded the point.

In the second quarter Coffey kicked a 16-yard field goal. Robinson picked off a Redell pass to set up Woods' two-yard touchdown and second-quarter scoring was rounded out by Coffey's 26-yard field goal.

Eskies marched from their own 46 for Coffey's third field goal, the 12-yarder.

Borden Nats Take Beating

We wended our way to Borden on Saturday and watched the Glace Bay Corianos hand two defeats to the Nationals by the top-sided scores of 10-3 and 9-1, thus winning the Maritime Intermediate "C" softball championship. This was certainly unexpected—considering that Borden had beaten the Corianos in Glace Bay 7-5. But the spectators took the worst licking of the afternoon. When you're getting ready to attend a football game, you remember to be properly clothed for the occasion, but softball is supposed to be summer game, and spectators often forget to be ready for the elements. Certainly on Saturday onlookers needed red flannels or a transfusion of eskimo blood to enjoy watching those games.

Glace Bay banged out 13 hits off Dale MacWilliams in the first game, but almost half of these were wind-blown flies which the Borden fielders didn't seem to be able to judge. And though they had to be scored as hits, they did seem to be the result of mental slips on the part of the boys wearing the gloves rather than skill on the part of those swinging the bats. T. Andrews, the Glace Bay pitcher, led his team's attack with two singles and a double. Earl Macdonald was the only Borden batter to get two hits, both singles, but E. Gallant hit an empty-bases homer in the sixth. In all Borden garnered eight hits. Blair Macdonald's defensive work in left field stood out.

After the first game we decided to get thawed out, and when we returned the Glace Bay team had the game in the bag. George Ramsay, who had done so well in Glace Bay, was knocked out of the game and MacWilliams had again taken up the pitching burden. It didn't account for the surprising reversal of form of the two teams, but it is possible that the boys from MacKay's Corner in Glace Bay are better windy weather performers. In any case, the Borden Nationals deserve a lot of credit for going as far as they did. They are N.B. — P.E.I. champions, and that's pretty good for a team which had just entered organized softball. They made a surprisingly good showing in hockey last year, so Borden is really developing as a first class sports town.

We must agree with a fellow columnist who deplores the fact that play-offs are extended so far into October, and thus the most important games of the season are often played under conditions adverse to best performance. Hockey play-offs have also been extended beyond reason, and although the appearance of so many artificial ice rinks has changed things, in many games in the early days, and some yet, have been and are played on slushy ice surfaces which are not conducive to good combination play.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Sam Mele, who marshalled Minnesota Twins from a disappointing tie for sixth place in 1964 to the American Baseball League pennant this year, was rewarded Saturday with a two-year contract calling for a \$10,000 annual raise.

Twins president Calvin Griffith and Mele reached agreement on the new pact by telephone Saturday morning. The two had discussed terms Friday but were about \$5,000 apart on a salary figure. Mele flew to his Quincy, Mass., home to think it over before giving his final decision.

Mele's new contract calls for a salary of \$47,000 for each of the next two years. He received an estimated \$37,000 each of the last two seasons.

Mele had sought \$50,000, it was reported, but Griffith would not meet that figure in a two-year contract. Griffith offered Mele \$45,000 at first, and the two compromised Saturday.

"Just say we agreed to terms," said Griffith, refusing to discuss details of the contract. "Everything is all set."

Mele did not actually sign the contract Saturday. That will be done by mail later.

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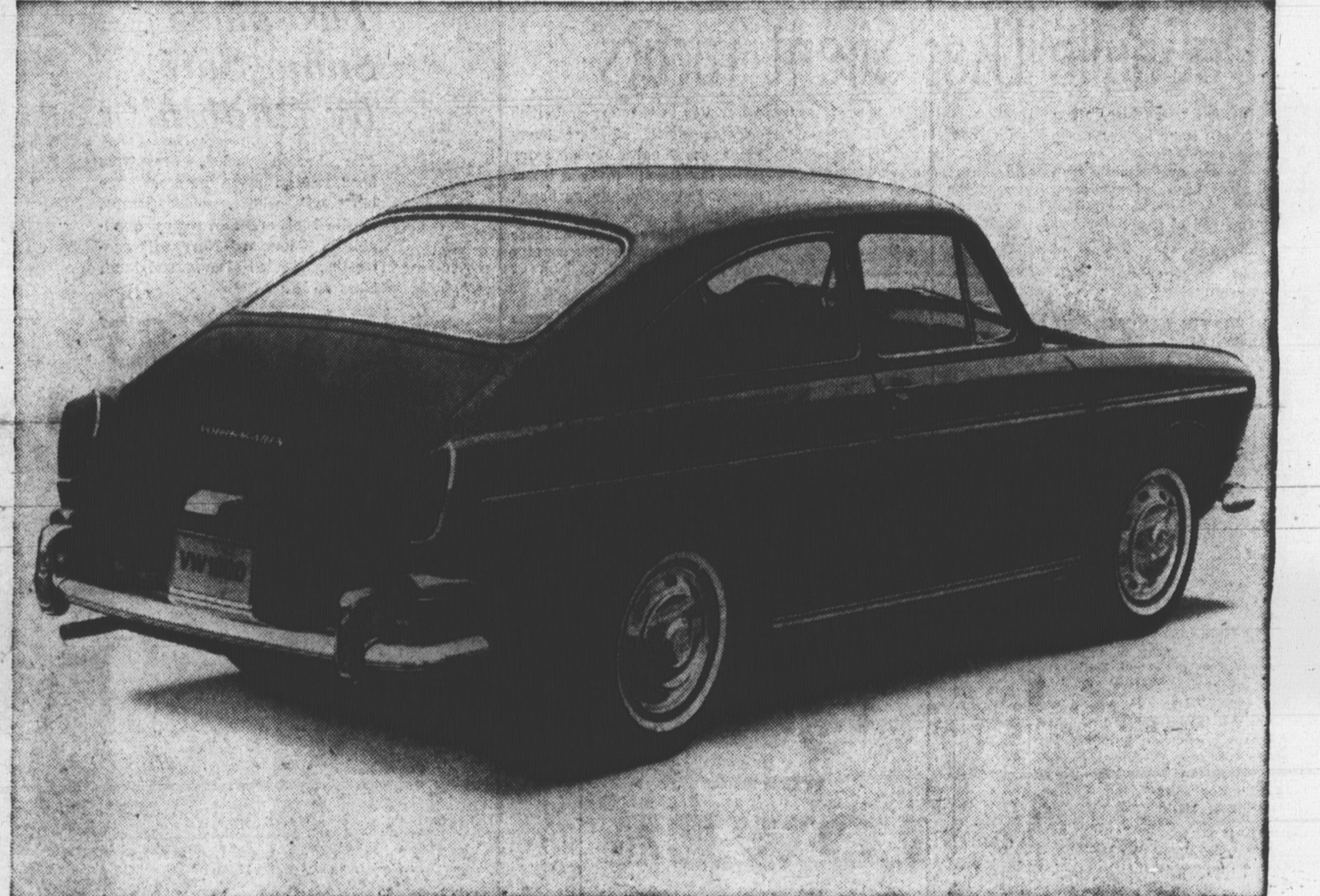
