London Truth says that speaking generally, all American railroad directors are knaves.

The specie in the Bank of France has decreased 7,830,000 francs in gold and 32,000 francs in silver.

The New Orleans Picayune thinks that a man, like a razor, is made keen by being frequently strapped.

General Grant's military education influences much of his life. Even in his speeches he draws parallels.

At Pesth the Minister of War has asked an extraordinary grant for strengthening the Galician fortresses and on the Russian border.

The Aurora states that the Pope has written a very important letter to Monsignor Guibert, Cardinal Archbishop of Paris, in regard to enforcement of decrees.

A military guard accompanies every train on the Mexican and Vera Cruz Railroad, at every station a guard is drawn up under arms on the arrival of every train.

Sir Alex. Galt says there was no truth in the rumor circulated by Opposition journals that he was about to enter the Cabinet. He leaves for England on Saturday next.

A Nevada bishop says there is no Sunday in that State. It is a mining State, and mining is so important and controlling an interest that religion has to take a back seat.

A private telegram from Sydney states that great political excitement prevails in Queensland. The mail contract has been suspended. The Ministry is denounced and the opposition is strongly supported.

It is said that Hon. Mr. Baby has resigned his position in the Ministry and accepts a Judgeship in the Quebec Court of Appeals in place of Judge Tassier, who is now on his way to Europe.

Prince William, the eldest son of the Crown Prince of Prussia, already commands a company of the Grenadier Guards, and elicited universal admiration during the late manoeuvres for the soldierlike and practised way in which he handled his men.

More than 200 babies were on exhibition at the infants' show in Horticulture Hall, Boston, on Monday, the object of which was announced to be to encourage greater care in the nursing and dieting of young infants, thereby securing a stronger and healthier race of young men and women. Among the infants were two pairs of twins from one family, a handsome Albino child and a few colored babes.

The Franciscans have been expelled from their establishments in Rennes and Avignon, France. At the latter place police were obliged to force doors and demolish barricades. Work of ejection lasted three hours. The Superior declared that he owned the building but he was nevertheless expelled. There was considerable excitement. Fourteen persons, including eight women, were arrested. Superior of Capuchins and Perhigoan on appearance of police pronounced an excommunication.

Military circles in France are much agitated by the dismissal of General DeCissey, who, as appeared from evidence given in a case which came before the courts, formed a criminal connection with one Madame Jung, who is believed to be a spy, and who, it is alleged, obtained from DeCissey, or through his negligence, possession of valuable French documents, which she transmitted to her employers. DeCissey denies the charge. He demanded an enquiry. This was refused, and he now threatens to appeal in some way to the civil tribunals.

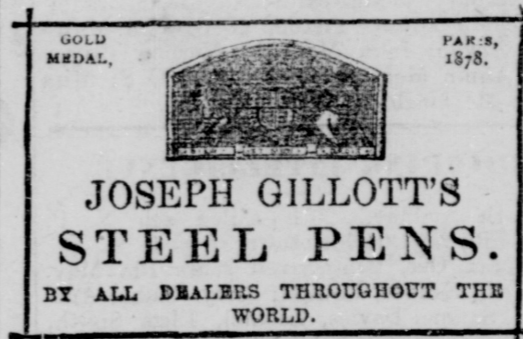

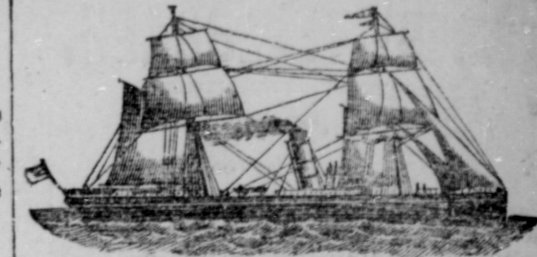
