Pitchfork Army Holds Fire

The "pitchfork" army held its fire Friday as hundreds of armed police reinforcements protected building workers at the site of a U. S. army housing project here. Some 2,000 shipyard workers, armed with pitchforks and clubs, forced the building men off the job in pitched battles with outnumbered police in the last two days. At one point, the "citizens' army" steered a bulldozer straight at the police riot squad and swept it of the site.

All roads in a wide area around the building site were cordoned off today and there was no sign of a new "invasion". Meanwhile, U. S. occupation authorities pointed out that the new housing project for Americans will enable the army to bring back 74 requisitioned German homes to their owners.

Mrs. Girouard said that since that time Emilie had been afflicted with fainting spells. She said she was not acquainted with the medical term for her sister's illness.

Strange But True

It may surprise a lot of Prince Edward Island folk when I tell them the story of a community hearse, which was built in 1924. The running gear was purchased from the firm of A. Horne and Co., Charlottetown. The body was built by James Duncan MacDonald of Kings County. The following fall, MacDonald made a winter hearse with Robert McLaren of Cardigan doing the iron work. The cost of both hearses was approximately \$450. This cost was met by the residents of Lorne Valley and vicinities at 50 cents per family. Non-share holders are charged \$3 for use of the vehicle.

It is interesting to note that both Catholics and Protestants have made use of the vehicle through the years, or up until quite recently when most persons needing such a service availed themselves of the MacKinnon funeral home at Montague.

James D. MacDonald, the builder, was also caretaker until his death in 1938. Then the care was given over to Mr. William McEachern of Cardigan. After Mr. McEachern moved to Montague in 1946, Linwood McNeill was appointed caretaker.

The community hearse was first used at the funeral of Susana Johnson, Cardigan Head, 1924. It was last used in June of 1953 when it bore the remains of Walter Myers, Cardigan to his final resting place. For the above data the writer is indebted to Mr. Wilbur MacDonald, Lorne Valley.

Mr. Strain entered the railway employ in 1919 on his return from overseas where he saw service with the Second Heavy Battery, having enlisted in 1914.

Death in Alberta of Mr. F. D. Blake

The following obituary appeared in a recent issue of the High River Times, High River, Alberta: "Relatives and friends were deeply shocked at the sudden death of Frederick Dean Blake of High River, which occurred early on the morning of July 28. Mr. Blake had seemed in good health and excellent spirits, and his son Donald and family, with whom he lived, had just left the previous day for holidays in Montana and were called home by the tragic news.

"He leaves to mourn his loss one son Donald and two grandchildren; five brothers and one sister. They are Edward of Calgary, Claude of Montreal; Dr. Jack, Vincent and Leo and Mrs. Harry Tidmarsh, all of Charlottetown, P.E.I. His wife predeceased him in 1937.

"Mr. Blake, who was 75 years of age, was born in Charlottetown, P. E. I. He came west in 1910 and was married in that year to Miss Loretta Farquharson of Charlottetown. He joined the staff of the High River Hardware, which had been established by his brother-in-law Charles Farquharson, later becoming a partner. In earlier years he was an enthusiastic curler, and an active member of the Elk's Lodge and of Rotary.

"Although a generous supporter of all the interests and activities of the town, Mr. Blake's greatest public service was in the capacity as councillor. He served on the Town Council for about sixteen years consecutively, reelected again and again because of his good work as head of the waterworks department. Under his capable administration this department emerged from the annual deficit to showing a profit on operation, and it was in his time that the waterworks surplus began its steady growth.

"Mr. Blake had a warmth and gentility of disposition which won him a wide circle of friends, and these old friends of early years were especially dear to him. He was unusually thoughtful in his remembrance of special occasions which had linked him with these contacts filled his life with many happy occasions.

"Requiem mass was celebrated at St. Francis de Sales Church on July 26 at ten a. m. with Rev. Father Edward Flanagan of Calgary conducting the services. Organist was J. Pickersgill, L. R. S. M., and Odette de Foras sang "Ave Maria."

"There was a very large attendance at the funeral, with many friends from Calgary, and the floral gifts were numerous and beautiful. Interment was in the family plot in the Highwood Cemetery, with the Snodgrass Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Pallbearers were Leonard Van Tighem, Earl Lewis, Dr. York Blayney, Charles Parker, Roy Robinson and Charles Clark.

Mr. Blake who was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Blake, Charlottetown, revisited his native Province last summer.

U. S. Rejects Polish Charges

WASHINGTON, (AP) - The United States has rejected as "completely untrue" Communist Polish charges that U. S. warplanes fired two Polish merchant ships near Hainan island July 26.

In a terse note delivered to the Friday, the state department "categorically rejected" Poland's protest and said: "No American planes fired on any vessel or ship of any kind Polish or otherwise, in that area."

Poland in a note July 31 said the incident occurred on the same day U. S. navy fighters shot down two Red Chinese planes. The American planes were searching for survivors of a British airliner which was shot down three days earlier, killing or wounding six American passengers.

Rededication Services Tomorrow



Rededication services will be held tomorrow, August 8 at Glasgow Road Presbyterian Church (above) after recent renovations which include the building of a spire and the addition of a vestry. The church also has been painted inside and out.

The history of Glasgow Road Church dates back to 1864 when subscriptions were undertaken for the building of a place of worship under the ministry of Rev. Donald Macdonald, minister of the Church of Scotland. The building erected at that time was situated at Forage, about four miles from the site of the present structure. Before its completion, Rev. Mr. Macdonald died and the ministry of the congregation was continued by Rev. John Goodwill.

In 1907 negotiations were begun to repair the existing structure or to build a new church. The result of these deliberations saw the erection of the place of worship which is being rededicated tomorrow.

Following Rev. Mr. Goodwill was Rev. Daniel MacLean who labored in the charge for 24 years. He in turn was succeeded by Rev. Donald Lamont. In 1934 the Glasgow Road congregation united with the Presbyterian Church in Canada and joined the Brookfield charge. Ministers since that time were Rev. Dr. A. O. Thompson, 1947-1951; Rev. Donald Nicholson, 1943-1951; Two student ministers occupied the pulpit during 1951 and 1952; they were Mr. Stanley Self and Mr. Lawrence Blackie. Mr. Blackie was ordained the following year and accepted a call as the regular minister.

The morning service tomorrow will be conducted by Rev. Mr. Blackie. During this service there will be special music by the Glasgow Road and Wheatley River choirs. The afternoon service at 3:00 p.m. will be conducted by Rev. E. H. Bean, B.D., B.Th., Clerk of the Maritime Synod. Music will be in charge of Hunter River choir. Rev. Donald MacKay, B.A., Moderator of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, Marjorie Trainor, preacher for the evening service. Special musical selections will be heard from the Girls' Trio of Summerside. All services will be held on Standard time.

SUMMER SCHOOL FOR TEACHERS CLOSED IN CH'TOWN YESTERDAY

Summing up yesterday afternoon after five weeks of intensive training in the Summer School for teachers, William A. MacPhee, Director of Teacher Training told the 64 students in attendance that their work had been highly satisfactory and the course a decided success.
