"I am HOLLER Than Thou"

The comment of the Patriot upon the signal victory of the Government in West Huron is, perhaps, worthy of some remark. The Patriot says:

"In the Dominion, the Abbott Government have latterly been carrying a 1 before them in the bye-elections in Ontario. Hon. Mr. Patterson, the new Secretary of State, was elected Tuesday in West Huron by the narrow majority of fifteen. We deeply regret the defeat of our old friend Mr. M. C. Cameron, one of the greatest scourges the Government bootleggers had. The overwhelming majority polled in Goderich would seem to indicate that the town had been bought up bodily. If the people of Ontario like that sort of thing they must have it; but it is hard for the electors of this Island, the large majority of whom want honest Government, to be tied by Confederation to a set of Provinces whose people appear contented to allow corruption to be the practical law of the State."

This is the position taken by our "standard elevators," our apostles of "political purity." It is the position which was taken by the pharisees and the hypocrite of old. The organized hypocrisy of Canada still clings to it. In fact, it is the only position they can take. It is hard, says the Patriot, for the people of Prince Edward Island to be associated with those of Ontario! So, "the electors of P. E. Island" are better and purer than the men who persist in keeping the Mowat Government in power and who have repeatedly elected "our old friend, Mr. M. C. Cameron."

The Patriot is too hard on those who have, all along, until now, sustained its friends. If it would see in the revolution against the Grits which has taken place in Ontario, a proof that the people of Ontario have been shocked and disgusted by revelations of political corruption on the part of their leaders it would see a large part of the truth. Not bribery by the Conservatives, but corruption and hypocrisy on the part of the Liberals, is one of the chief causes of the fact that "the Abbott Government have latterly been carrying all before them."

This, with a clearer perception of the deluged tendencies and ill-concealed shams which underlie the unrestrictive reciprocity dodge, sufficiently accounts for the Government victories in Ontario. It is not necessary to traduce the people of Ontario, or to make odious comparisons between them and the people of Prince Edward Island.

The majority of electors in Queen's and Prince Counties have been deceived and misled concerning Unrestricted Reciprocity and the alleged purity of the Liberal Party. But they have not, like the people of West Huron, and other constituencies in Ontario, had an opportunity to rectify their error. Mr. Davies and his followers in parliament have taken very good care that they shall not have an opportunity to do so. There are indications that many of our honest Liberals repent the support which they have given, in conjunction with Mercier, to a policy of Annexation under a false name. The people of the border counties of Ontario—who would profit more by true reciprocity—have renounced the fad, and so, we believe, have the loyal Liberals of P. E. Island. That Mr. Davies thinks so, too, has been made evident by his desperate, and finally successful, struggle to prevent the courts from opening Queen's and King's Counties.

Closing the Straits of Belle Isle.

SIR.—It does seem ungrateful to discourage "Esotericist" in his grand projects for improving the climate, railway communications and political relationships of these Gulf provinces. Indeed, against the last two we have not a word to say, but we feel like taking exception to the effort being made to coax the people of P. E. Island into a belief that the rigors of their wintry climate which is their one disadvantage, to their otherwise unexceptionable little Province, may be banished by legislative enactment.

Closing the Straits of Belle Isle, this writer says, would prevent the flow of ice coming around our shores in winter, which, he says, is the cause of our severe weather. It is true that we have a great deal of ice in the Gulf in winter. Even during the present mild spell it is very abundant. But does it come from Belle Isle? We always can recognize northern ice, because it has bergs with it. I have seen a great deal of the ice round our coasts, but never yet recognized a berg. There is always plenty of pack-ice 20 or 30 feet thick, but this is a very different thing from berg ice, which may be 50 or 100 feet thick, solid ice. The ice which comes round our Island and into the Northumberland Strait was formed in the early winter of the northern and western parts of the Gulf, where the mean temperature in January is 10° below that of the Island.

"Esotericist" bases a calculation of the quantity of ice entering by Belle Isle on the assumption that its current is 48 miles a day. This is about three times its average rate, for at times the stream actually runs out into the Atlantic (F. J.) As Belle Isle Straits "may be full of icebergs at any season of the year," why do they not come to our shores every season of the year? Simply because Belle Isle waters do not come here at all.

J. J. Fox, Chief Officer of Customs in the Magdalen for thirty years, member of the N. S. Institute of Science, writes: "My own opinions are held with regard to icebergs drifting through the strait (of Belle Isle) into the Gulf; they correct one apparent fact that bergs are sometimes found about its northern entrance."

The best proof that Belle Isle waters do not flow into our part of the Gulf is the following: Whitesides found the waters in the deep soundings of the Gulf, between Anticosti and Bird Island—313 fathoms—to be at a temperature of 50 degrees. Now the Belle Isle waters are at a temperature of from 28 to 34 degrees, and if they came into the body of the Gulf their gravity, by reason of their low temperature, would cause them sink to the bottom and fill the deep soundings with ice-cold water. The permanent warmth of these deep soundings is proved by the fact that from them have been dredged the only true corals of the genus *Favosites* ever found north of New York. Nothing but the permanent warmth of a spur from the Gulf stream could afford a home for this delicate southern organism. Even in midwinter the east of Anticosti is warm as Portland, Maine. (G. D. D.)

The Belle Isle current enters the Gulf at Belle Isle, passes down the west of New Foundland and goes out between Cape Rey and North as a deep sea under our feet. Look at the Isothermic Chart for February, and you will see its course clearly indicated by the temperatures. Every observer on P. E. Island knows that a north-east or even north wind, which blows off this central warm-water region of the Gulf is never very cold, and you see real cold winds from the north-west and west, which come from the high lands of Gaspe and the frozen plains of the interior. A north-west wind will bring a temperature down on us—ice or no ice in the Gulf. F. B.
