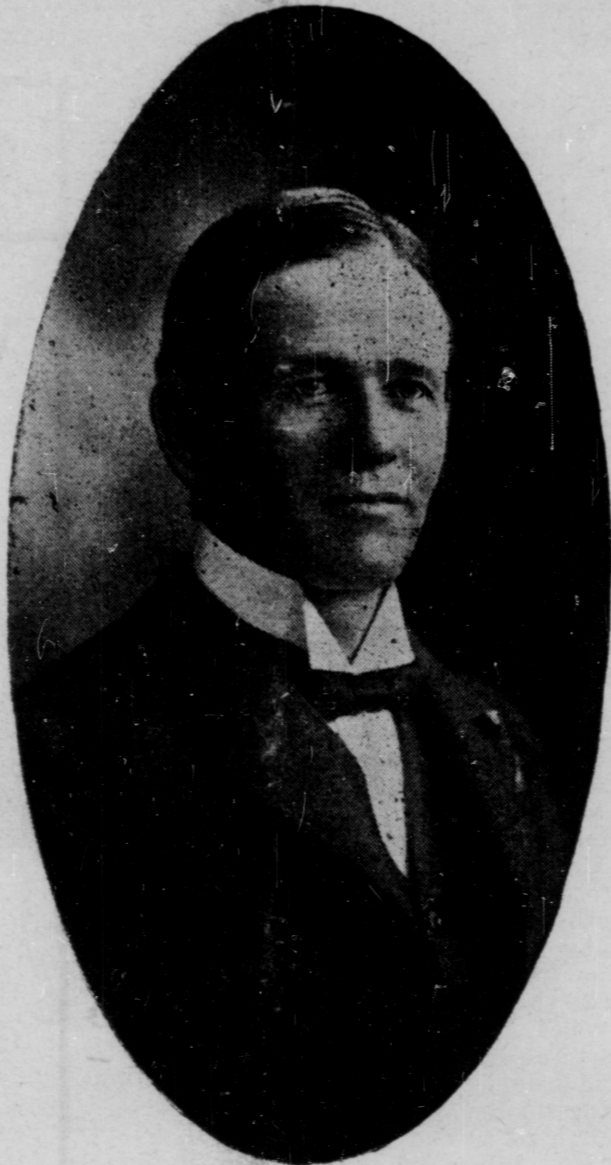

### COMPLAINTS AT CAPETOWN.

Dispensed With Volunteers too Soon.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—The Capetown correspondent of the Mail comments on the "astonishing outburst of Boer activity" and points out the possibility of the Boers having been considerably reinforced. Complaints are heard in Cape Town, he asserts, regarding the premature departure and dispensing with the services of the volunteer forces.

### BRIBERY EXPOSED.

Another Barefaced Case—On Behalf of Sifton.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 31.—Another case of barefaced bribery has come to light in the election here.

James Morrow, who was nominated for the Commons as a Patron but declined, was summoned from the country by a telegram sent by Dr. McArthur, (Siftonite).

On arriving here, in haste, Morrow was asked by McArthur to take the stump for Sifton in Brandon.

This he refused to do, being a supporter of Hugh John MacDonald. McArthur said there must be some mistake, and enquiring where Morrow was staying, left him.

Next day Morrow was called on by C. W. Bradshaw, a well known Siftonite lawyer, who represented himself as appearing for the Conservatives, and offered Morrow \$1000 over and above expenses on condition that he would contest Lisgar against R. L. Richardson, entering the field as Conservative candidate. This big amount Morrow refused, and he has given to the public the facts over his own signature.

The Tribune publishes a facsimile of the telegram received by Morrow from McArthur.

The object in getting Morrow in the field was the expectation, apparently, that he would take enough votes from Richardson to defeat him.

### PREFERENTIAL TRADE.

The Saturday Review Contradicts Laurier.
