FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT.—The firemen are getting ready for their big tournament on the 29th June and 1st of July, which promises to be a great success. The pyrotechnic display on the evening of the first day will be one of the best of the kind ever seen in the Province. Twelve cases of fireworks arrived last night from Hamilton, Ont. Amongst the lot are 6 or 7 net pieces including a steam fire engine, the Canadian Arms, Punch and Judy, and the mottoes "Welcome Brother Firemen" and "Good Night; Good Luck." There is also a great assortment of rockets, crosses, etc. The new caps for the Hook and Ladder Company also arrived last evening.

House of Commons.

THE RE-DISTRIBUTION BILL.

OTTAWA, June 17. The Re-distribution Bill is still being discussed in committee. Yesterday Haggart took the opportunity of McCarthy being in his seat to refer to the speech of the latter, when he referred to him (Haggart) personally. He made a brilliant speech, showing the members of North Simcoe that while he was not the slave of the Government, as no one said he was or desired him to be so, he (Mr. Haggart) would claim the same right for every other member on the Conservative side of the House. There were none of the Conservative members asked to be slaves of their party. What did the statement of McCarthy mean that the Government was strong enough now to do what was right? Did it signify that if the Government was not so strong they might be just in doing what was wrong? Whether weak or strong the Government intended to do what was right, and it was for these reasons that they desired the support of their followers, and for these reasons alone. He then referred to the amendment of Mills, under which it would be possible to make a gerrymander of the very worst kind. The gerrymander proceeded to talk against time until the committee rose.

The Presbyterian Assembly.

MONTREAL, June 17. In the Presbyterian Assembly the names of Rev. J. Sedgwick, Dr. A. B. McKay, James Croft, David Laird and David Morice were added to the list of delegates to the Presbyterian Council. Thirty-six churches and mansees were built last year west of Winnipeg, at a value of \$60,000. The statistical report showed a steady increase in membership in church. The total income in 1875 was \$981,672, this year \$2,463,239. The revenue more than doubled in 17 years. The increase over last year was \$1,941. The record report showed 47,000 circulation. The widows and orphans fund of the Maritime Provinces has a capital of \$83,000, added this year, \$3,223. Eighteen widows and four orphans are on the fund. Seventy-eight widows are on the western section fund; amounts paid, \$13,453, invested, \$138,000. Forty-four widows are on the Church of Scotland synod widows fund. This fund has a capital of \$116,000. Receipts over expenditure.

Another Rumor About Edward Blake.

TORONTO, June 17. A Liberal member of the House of Commons is authority for the statement that Gladstone has promised that if returned to power Hon. Edward Blake will be Secretary for Ireland.

Whirlwind at Cow Bay.

HALIFAX, June 17. A whirlwind struck Cow Bay, this county, on Wednesday. It cut swath thirty feet wide through the forest, unroofed barns and did other damage.
