## Fined For Violations Of Aeronautics Act

Parker E. Hamilton, Murray River, was fined a total of \$125 when he appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday, after having pleaded guilty on Monday, to two violations of the aeronautics act.

He was fined \$100 and costs or 30 days for flying a plane at night, when not licensed to do so and \$25 and costs or 15 days for failure to submit a flight plan at the Charlottetown Airport.

Magistrate James B. Johnston prior to sentencing cited the danger involved in such action. Mr.

Robert Jardine of Freetown had his case adjourned to December 1 in order to consult a lawyer. He was charged with stopping at an intersection and proceeding without yielding to oncoming traffic.

## Car Operator Is Charged With Criminal Negligence

**SUMMERSIDE** — A resident of Abram's Village, Andrew Joseph Gallant, was charged with criminal negligence in the operation of a motor vehicle, causing bodily harm to Gerald Joseph Blanchard, Plusville, in Prince County Magistrate's Court yesterday before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald.

The charge arose from an accident at Wellington Centre on November 4, in which both the accused and Blanchard were injured. The accused told the magistrate he had just gotten out of hospital this morning. He was remanded to November 30 without plea. Bail was set at \$300 cash or \$1,000 in two sureties of \$500 each. G. Bruce MacDonald is acting for the accused.

Two Lennox Island youths, James David Bernard, 16, and Michael Roy Ernest Sark, 17, were each charged with indecent assault of a female resident of the Island on November 21. They were remanded to November 29 without plea for a date to be set for trial. Bail was set at \$5,000 in two sureties of \$2,500 for each accused. They are represented by G. Bruce MacDonald.
