LIFE IN JAPAN.—The Rev J W Wadman returned missionary from Japan, will give a descriptive talk, under the auspices of the Sunday School of the First Methodist Church, on Japan and the Japanese tonight at 8 o'clock. REGATTA.—A meeting of the Hillsborough Boating Club was held last night at which Mr Joseph McCarey was appointed chairman, and in conjunction with Dr S R Jenkins and Mr T Bonaghan, a committee to arrange for a race to take place on Saturday, the 10th of September. Boats between 18 and 24 feet on the water-line will be known as first class; and boats under 18 feet will be in the second class. The course for the larger boats is yet to be decided on that for the smaller boats will be inside the harbor. Only working sails will be allowed—the committee to decide as to what constitute working sails. Boats will start from a given point or line with sails brailled. Entrance fee will be one dollar to be paid on the day before the race. A letter was read from Mr John P Joy, offering a silver cup to be competed for by boats of the Maritime Provinces, to be won three years in succession. The committee decided to confer with Mr Joy to have the conditions of his offer modified, if possible.

ST. PATRICK'S SCHOOL.—Decided and much needed improvements have been made in St. Patrick's School. Many of the class rooms have been enlarged, and the halls and rooms throughout the building have been painted and cleaned. The school now presents a very respectable appearance.

THE YANKEES WIN.—The all New York cricket team succeeded in upholding the honor of the metropolitan cricketers, at Livingston, S. I., on Saturday, by reversing the result of the first day's play with the crack Canadian team. They defeated the visitors on the total scores of the two innings, which were easily completed, by 31 runs, the contest being throughout one of high interest and causing considerable excitement.

POURCE COURT.—During the month of August there have been 35 convictions for drunkenness; 3 convictions and 4 dismissals for larceny; 5 convictions and 4 dismissals for assault; 1 conviction and 2 dismissals of persons charged with infractions of the Liquor Regulation Act; 8 fines for non-payment of dog tax; 1 dismissal for nuisance; 1 conviction for carrying an offensive weapon. Seven prisoners were sent up to the Supreme Court charged with indictable offences. The total receipts at the Police Court for the month amounted to \$307.76, of which \$74 was for dog tax.

The three-masted schooner Delight, Capt. McDonald, of Souris, now discharging coal for Peake Bros., will load with oats for Carvell Bros., for Guadalupe. The Delight, it will be remembered, is the schooner that on a recent trip met with a number of the bodies of the victims of the La Burgogne disaster.
