

Moncton Pro John Munroe Captures P.E.I. Golf Title

John "Jook" Munroe reigns as the new king of Prince Edward Island golf today after having come from three strokes off the pace to over a half first round leader Jim Baxter of Bathurst.

Baxter led by three strokes as play in the second round got underway yesterday afternoon, having fired a 70 Saturday, the best round posted in the tourney. However Munroe hit a long drive and deadly approach on the first hole and followed with a one putt cutting Baxter's margin to two strokes.

Perhaps a bit shaken by this reversal in form Baxter pushed an approach shot to the right on the third hole and then took three to get down from off the green. On the fifth again Baxter's approach shot deserted him and he was forced to chip and then two putt. In the meanwhile Munroe was playing steady golf and now was all even with Baxter.

On the sixth Baxter unleashed a tremendous 300 yard drive, but rather than settle for a safe five went for the birdy, and drove his second shot behind the tee for number seven. His first chip was short and then when he did get on two putted. Munroe parred this hole and went one up in the match. The players matched strokes up to the ninth hole so at the turn Munroe was one stroke up.

However Munroe lost this slim margin on the tenth as he pushed his second shot wide of the green and ended up with a bogey. Baxter hit a fine chip shot and one putt for a par and the match was even once more.

The turning point in the duel between the leaders came on the fifteenth as Baxter pulled a most a duplication of his performance on number six. He unleashed a 300 yard drive but ended up in the rough on his second shot and then took four strokes to get the ball down. Munroe on the other hand played safe all the way, getting down in four and he was two up with three holes to play.

The duet set the stage for a thrilling finish as Munroe on the seventeenth bogied and fell back to within one stroke of Baxter. However both players hit fine shots to the eighteenth green and two putted for pars.

Maurice "Mousie" Dowling was third in the 36 hole contest as he fired 152, four strokes off the pace. From then on scores started to bunch as up Lorne Jennex toured the last six holes in two under to end up with a 76 and a total of 154. Jiggs MacDonald and Errol Nicholson finished with 155's and Jim Walker of Moncton had a 156. Pre-tourney favorite, "Bobby" Dowling had two double bogies on the final round and finished with a 157 in eighth place.

Hank Seifred, RCAF Base, Summerside, fired rounds of 76-78 over the wind swept course to take a two stroke victory over runner up Don Cousie in the Amateur championship.

TAKE THREE

Cousie was up by a stroke after 18 holes with a 75 to Seifred's 76 but he went to an 81 for a total of 156, two behind Seifred.

In the first division Merrill Pineau came home with top honors carding a 156. However there was a heated controversy at the club for a while as a Junior player, Peter Clark, playing with a first division handicapper came in with a 155. However it was eventually decided that he was only eligible for the Junior Championship. D. V. MacDonald carded a 162 to place a distant second to Pineau and a 142.

The Juniors actually had better scores than the first division as the leader Clark won with a 155 and was followed closely by Ron Garrett and Bob Irwin with 156 and 158 respectively. Irwin won the low net in this class with a 144.

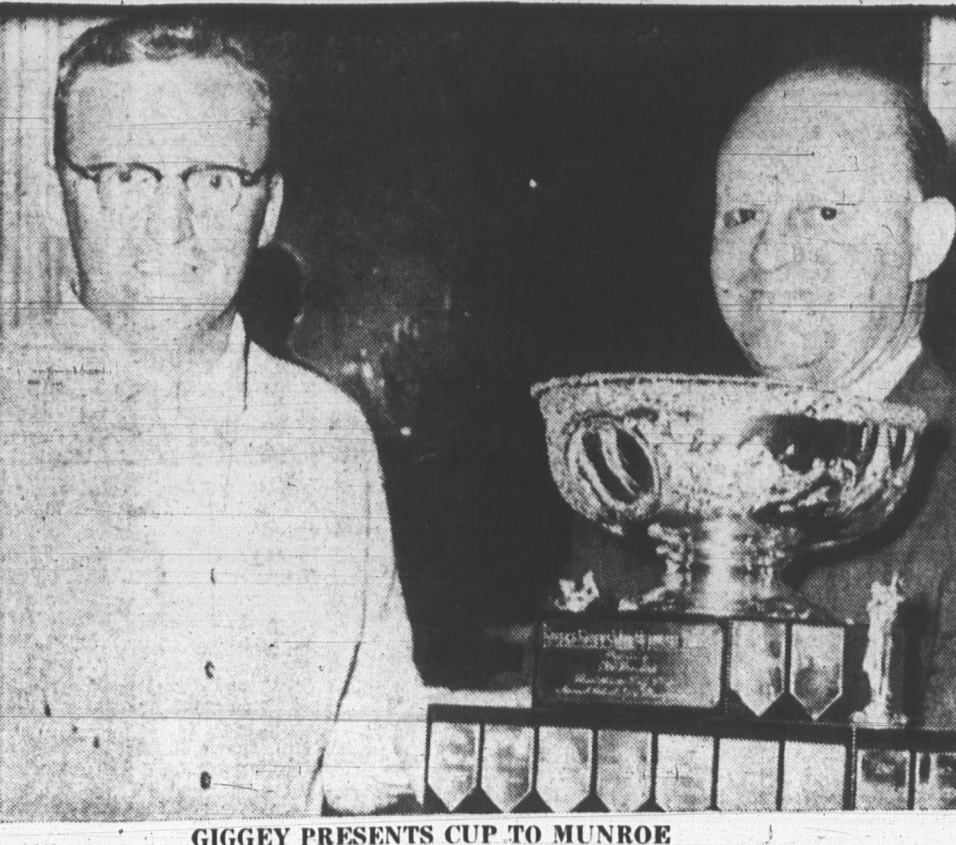
In the Senior Division Edgar Taylor posted a fine 156 and a 44 to coast to a comfortable margin of six strokes over runner up Dr. Kent Irwin. Wes Stoney had a 214 thirty six hole total and he took top honors in the net class with an adjusted score of 142.

Duke MacDonald of the host Belvedere Club walked off with top honors in the second division with a 167 as he eked out a one stroke margin over Thane Burke of Montreal. Dr. G. D. Barrett was a close third as he posted a two round total of 169. MacDonald had a five stroke lead over Burke and an eight stroke margin over Barrett going into the second round. John Weldon of the U.S. took top honors in net division as he posted an adjusted score of 143 and he was followed by Frank Acorn whose 171 was parred to a 148.

In the third division R. Clement of Summerside had rounds of 80-93 for a 173 total, three better than Dr. W. Nicholas of Oakville. A Hogan of Truro placed third in the gross competition with a 180. Don Gallant of Green Gables led the net parade carding a 182 which rounded out to 146 while Murray Kays of Belvedere had a 184 revised to 148.

Miller took top honors in the fourth division with a 181 six strokes ahead of James Hansen from the U.S. D. J. MacCormick was third with a gross of 188. D. MacKenzie posted the low gross, carding a 198 while his net was brought down to 136, the best net score in the tourney. He was followed by G. Murphy from Connecticut who had a net total of 141.

Ron MacFarlane of Summerside took the third Gross prize with a 164. Low gross in the first division went to Gerry Burgoyne who shot a duo of 80 and his handicap brought his 160 score down to 140, the lowest net score in the tourney. Bob Schurman was second in the first division net class with a 149 after he shot a 170.
