

Education That Does Not Educate.

Few persons, we think, will contradict us if we say that this particular kind of education is very common. What observing man is there who cannot cite one or more examples of young persons who appear to have derived absolutely no intellectual benefit from their school studies—in whom no intellectual curiosity appears to have been awakened, nor any single intellectual aptitude brought into play? Cases of this kind abound on every side. We see young people emerging from the higher forms of our schools and colleges, who are supposed to have learnt a great deal, who certainly have gone through the form of studying a great variety of school books; and yet when we come to test their intelligence in any practical way, when we ask them to think, to put that and that together, to check some statement by the knowledge they are supposed to possess, we find that what they have learnt—all their elaborate school drill—is of no value for any such purpose. Sometimes we make an even more depressing discovery; we find that their minds are in a condition of torpor that positively suggests the action of some special narcotic influence and that such action as they are capable of, under stimulus, is marked by complete incoherence and confusion.
