BATHURST, N.B. (CP) - The Irvingline, an oil barge that was driven aground off Bathurst harbor Nov. 27 in a severe windstorm, will stay there for the winter, a salvage company spokesman said Monday. Shore ice was surrounding the vessel and would be done to free her until spring, the spokesman said. The barge would be secured for the winter, a watchman placed aboard and work would continue to patch up a hole in the smelter in the vessel during the storm.

When the ice became strong enough, equipment to repair the vessel could be hauled out to her by horse team, the spokesman added.
