King's County Fish And Game Association Meets

The regular meeting of the King's County Fish and Game Protection Association was held last evening at Murray River, presided over by president, Judge J. S. DesRoches.

The minutes of the last meeting were read, and after one correction were approved.

The matter of prizes for the crow shoot was discussed, and it was moved that \$25 be awarded as first prize.

A general discussion followed on the opening of the goose season, and although all agreed that all seasons should open simultaneously, it was thought preferable to have the opening date a week or so later in October, possibly on the 10th.

In line with the policy of recommending sites for investigation for the placing of dams, the meeting presented three possibilities: Fox River pond, Gladstone; Thompson's Pond, Alton Bay; and Macdonald pond, Glen William.

Mr. Harvey Moore, Commercial Cross, spoke briefly regarding his sanctuary near his home. He requested some assistance in furthering his work which was rapidly granted by the association.

The sum of \$50 was voted and at the same time it was moved that a recommendation be made to the Department of Industry and Natural Resources that assistance in maintaining his sanctuary be granted Mr. Moore.

Mr. Frank Week, of St. Peter's Harbour, where he is training hunting dogs, spoke briefly, explaining why dogs were important to the hunter, not only in finding birds but also in retrieving wounded ones.

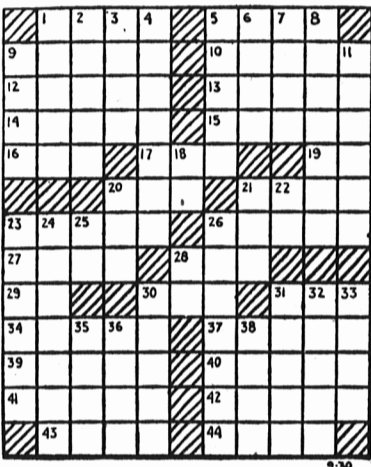
