Boston Bruin Arrives Home

Charlottetown's Forbie Kennedy, the Island's only representative in the National Hockey League arrived in Charlottetown, last night, by plane from Boston. Kennedy was sidelined for the year when he went crashing into a goal post in a game at Boston Garden in which the Bruins were hosting the slumping Montreal Canadiens.

Forbie was playing on a regular line Thursday night for the first time this season and it was most unfortunate for the stocky blockbuster that he experienced this accident which resulted in a broken collar bone. Forbie's mother, Marie, his wife and young brother James were in the stands at the Boston Garden when Forbie received the injury.

Kennedy had fired six goals for the Beantown lads up to that point and four of those markers had come when the Bruins were shorthanded. Forbie spend the greater part of the season in a penalty killing role with the Milt Schmidt coached squad and the Boston coach has been quoted as saying he thinks the Island's most successful hockey performer in the 'big time' is one of the best penalty killers in the National Hockey League.

We feel that considering his performance this season that Kennedy will figure heavily in the Bruin's plans for next year's campaign and this will be something of a change for Forbie. Each season Kennedy has been forced to earn his position and there were times when we thought he didn't get treated fairly by the parties in power, and as a result spent a couple of years battling his way back into hockey's greatest league.

Forbie's young brother, James, has been denting the Bruins consistently in local hockey circles this season, and with a bit of weight he feel young Kennedy should stand a good chance of catching on with a junior 'A' hockey club if he is given the opportunity. Forbie played his junior hockey with the Montreal Canadiens and Forbie was quite a sensation with the Junior Habs and is now blossoming into a top NHL performer.

Forbie and his family will be residing at 36 Alley Street until ice making time rolls around and he returns to the hockey wars. Congratulations to Forbie for a fine performance and we feel we are speaking for all Islanders in extending these sentiments to the Island's most successful hockey son.

P.E.I. Tops Newfoundland In Curling Championship

By DON ANGUS FREDERICTON (CP)—New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Ontario were bunched atop the Canadian schoolboy curling championship standings after completion of the second day of play in the five-day bonspiel.

Both Tony Richardson's rink from Moncton and Stuart Campbell's Bridge Water, N.S., foursomes had clean sweeps of the three rounds curled Tuesday.

Nova Scotia picked up a crucial fifth-round victory Tuesday night by toppling previously undefeated Saskatchewan, skipped by Dan Fink of Regina, 6-5 in a match that was only decided when Fink's last stone failed to stay in the house for the required two points that would have sent the game into an extra end.

Paul Savage's Ontario rink from Don Mills managed to squeeze past Northern Ontario under skip Wayne Steaki of North Bay by piling up three counters in the final end for a 7-6 victory, while in an adjacent lane New Brunswick's Richardson led his rink to an easy 8-4 decision over Quebec.

Alberta moved into fourth place behind the three leaders—all with 4-1 records—by posting a tight 7-5 decision over British Columbia Doug Dobry's quartet from Viking, Alta., picked up its third win against one setback when British Columbia's

skip Dennis Perry of Burnaby missed a draw and shot rock with his last stone and left Alberta counting one for the insurance margin.

TRAILED 5-4 Alberta was trailing 5-4 after seven ends, but picked up single points in each of the eighth, ninth and 10th ends.

In the other 7th-round game of the 11-round tournament, Dave Matheson's Prince Edward Island rink from Charlottetown gained its first victory by edging winless Newfoundland, with skip Fred Durant of Grand Falls, by a 7-6 score. The Prince Edward Island foursome counted twice in the last end to put the match away.

Grant Wuckert's Manitoba rink from Winnipeg drew a bye through round five and stayed with a 2-1 record. The sixth round is set to start at 2:30 p.m. AST today.

In the third round Tuesday, New Brunswick defeated British Columbia 10-5. Manitoba downed Prince Edward Island 12-3. Newfoundland was swamped 13-3 by Ontario. Alberta defeated Northern Ontario 5-4, and Nova Scotia took a 7-5 decision from Quebec.

Northern Ontario edged British Columbia 9-8 in the fourth round played in the afternoon, Quebec upset Newfoundland 10-9. Nova Scotia humiliated Prince Edward Island 11-4. Saskatchewan defeated Manitoba 9-7, and New Brunswick picked up two points in the last end to brush—ast Ontario in a crucial contest. It was the Ontario rink's first loss.
