City School Statistics.

A SHORT TIME ago the City School Board asked for a statement showing the locality in which the various pupils attending the city schools are resident.

In Ward 1..... 49 boys and 56 girls.
" 2..... 28 " 24 "
" 3..... 45 " 46 "
" 4..... 92 " 110 "
" 5..... 248 " 309 "

Residing east of Prince Street there are 464 pupils, and west of Prince Street 543. Residing east of Great George Street, there are 625 pupils, and west of Great George Street 348.

A dividing line, every part of which is equidistant from Prince Street and West Kent Street Schools would run as follows: From the corner of Water and Prince Street to the corner of Byfield Street and Spring Park Road. By following the streets, the dividing line would begin at the corner of Prince and Water streets; thence to Grafton Street along Grafton to Great George Street, thence to Fitzroy Street, and along Fitzroy Street to Queen Street, thence to Chestnut Street, along Chestnut Street to Spring Park Road and on to the city limit.

Cotton.

Columbus Celebration.

PRINCE STREET SCHOOL and West Kent Street School celebrated the Columbus anniversary to-day. At 11 o'clock the pupils of Prince Street School were massed in the upper hall and addressed by His Worship the Mayor.

The exercise commemorative of the discovery of America, held at Prince Street School to-day, was of a very interesting character. At 11 o'clock, a m., the pupils were marched from their respective classrooms to the front of the building, where a very fine flag-staff has recently been erected. A committee of young ladies from the High School raised the Canadian ensign. As the flag reached the mast-head the school sang "The National Anthem," and saluted the flag. After another song they repaired to the upper hall and rendered the following programme:

The chair was occupied by R. J. Johnson, M. D. Addresses were given by His Worship Mayor Haviland, F. L. Hazard, E. G. and Rev. W. W. Brewer.

The celebration began at West Kent Street School at 10 o'clock. In the presence of a good audience the following programme was rendered: PROGRAMME. Song—The Flag we Love..... Excellent addresses were delivered by the Rev. W. Hamlyn, on Columbus, his times and history; Hon. David Laird, "The Results of his Discovery"; and Rev. Mr. Sutherland, "The Flag." The latter address was happily delivered just after the new flag was raised above the building. Though the boys had had their dinner Mr. Sutherland raised their patriotism and enthusiasm to the highest pitch. He taught that the flag told them to love their country, to hate meanness and to fight for the right. A fitting climax to the entertainment was afforded by Lt. C. I. King, who proposed three cheers for the flag and the Queen. At the close the National Anthem was sung.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

The Guardian Again.

SIR,—The Guardian this morning says: "One of the saddest evils following the repeal of the Scott Act is the sending of young children to the saloons for beer. This, we are informed, frequently happens now, and sometimes the children are sent by their mothers. Whatever faults the Scott Act had, it practically put a stop to this evil."

The editor may have the means of ascertaining who purchase liquor in Charlottetown, but when he states that under the Scott Act no liquor was purchased by children, he states what every person who knows anything of Scott Act days knows to be untrue. It was notorious that many purchases of liquor during those times were made by women and children, and the reason was that the children of these women and children being subjected to a very slight. The Scott Act was in force in Charlottetown for ten years, many of the witnesses on the prosecutions under the Act were minors, ranging from 14 years of age upwards. Would the Guardian men tell us where these boys learned to drink? It could not have been under the old license law, for none of them remember it. In Victoria the Scott Act is in force and I have no doubt but that the place possesses a temperance society and a branch of the W. C. T. U. Byrne and his wife, it was well known, were addicted to drink; they had no children to send for it, but it appears they got enough of it, and this under the Scott Act and in a small village where they could easily be seen going to the illicit dens.
