### Non-resident Tax Discussed By Kensington Town Council

The Kensington Town Council held its regular monthly meeting on Monday night with Mayor Everett Chapman in the chair and all councillors present. Bills to the amount of \$845.51 were ordered paid on motion of Councillor Bruce Roberts seconded by Councillor Bruce MacLeod. A letter was read from the railway superintendent, G.R. Green, regarding the paving of the railway lot in Kensington and asking for an estimate of the cost. Considerable discussion was given to the matter of taxing non-residents working in the town and the matter was finally left over for further discussion at a later date. Councillor Carruthers reported on the meeting held in Charlotteville for the purpose of organizing the Federation of Prince Edward Island Municipalities. It was moved by Councillor Bruce MacLeod, seconded by Councillor Elmer Paynter, that the police committee be authorized to buy handcuffs and equipment for the policeman's uniform. Policeman Livingston, who was present was instructed to watch for and check reckless drivers and to check also the dangerous practice of more than one person riding on one bicycle. It was decided that more street lights were needed at certain points and that caution or stop signs were needed, especially on the school streets. On motion of Councillor Elmer Paynter, seconded by Councillor Clark, it was decided that the Mayor and Councillors ask for the co-operation of all citizens and service clubs in the clean up week dating May 20th to May 27th. After considerable discussion the town clerk was authorized to write for quotations on a new fire truck. Councillor Carruthers reported that consideration is being given by the Government on the matter of repaving a portion of the public highway running through the town.

## Inside Story Of Teamsters Union Told Senate Group

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate probes were given an inside story Tuesday of how Dave Beck ordered \$2,000 employees of Montgomery Ward and Co. into the Teamsters Union after supporting the management in a bitter proxy fight two years ago. The story came from Alfons Landa of Washington, lawyer for the Fruehauf Trailer Company and a witness before the Senate subcommittee investigating the union. Landa testified that Beck, head of Beck, held \$2,000,000 worth of stock in the mail order house and had intended to vote it for financier Louis Wolfson in Wolfson's 1955 fight to wrest control from the Sewell Avery management. Landa related how he expressed to Beck "surprise" that the "Teamsters would support 'the rascal' Wolfson. "I said I was sure that if he would support the Montgomery Ward management he could have Montgomery Ward into the Teamsters Union," the witness said. Beck seized on this as "a good idea." Landa testified. He said Beck told him Avery had resisted all previous attempts by the Teamsters to unionize the mail order company. Landa said he passed the word along to Montgomery Ward, the Teamsters voted against Wolfson, and subsequently the Teamsters organized the employees. Expressing indignation at the story, Senator Barry Goldwater (Rep. Ariz.) demanded of Landa: "Do you think it's proper for unions to go into proxy fights and control of companies just so they can organize the workers regardless of the workers' wishes?" Landa replied he had never thought of it that way. "I just made the suggestion to Mr. Beck that I thought it would overcome

## Report Good Lobster Catches In W. Prince Area This Week

Prospects for a good lobster season brightened on Monday when West Prince fishermen landed excellent catches, two Alberton boats bringing in slightly over a thousand pounds each and a number of others between six and nine hundred pounds. Catches were equally as good in the Tignish area. The weather resulted in no sizable landings the first week of the season which opened May first and a serious shortage of bait continues to hamper fishermen. Herring are being brought to the island from the mainland at between seven and eight dollars a barrel and it is estimated that fishermen at Alberton South have paid out over five thousand dollars for bait with only two weeks of the season gone.

(Continued from page 2) farm help from Newfoundland. There are encouraging prospects that this attempt may prove successful, but there will be no definite word for upwards of a week. The Province of Ontario has recruited more than 200 Newfoundlanders for farming and has been offering \$75.00 per month a net board for single men. TREND APPARENT It has been noted by the employment section of the Local Office that very few young people are applying for work, and it is apparent that large numbers of young men and young women are leaving for Upper Canada attracted by higher wages, and the numerous opportunities for employment. This trend which has been apparent for some years past, quickened last year, and there is every indication that it will continue during the present year. Officials of the Charlottetown Office, because of this migration feel that it will be difficult to fill permanent local vacancies in the office area in the months ahead. The outlook for construction when all the local projects awaiting commencement get underway is very bright indeed, and it is altogether likely that shortage of carpenters, tradesmen and labourers may develop before the coming of summer. The opening of the lobster season and fishing in general, resulted in the return of work of many people at all of the Island fishing centres. At such places as Souris, Rustico, Lower Montague and Gasperoux, many men and women have been re-employed in the fish plants, and at the main fishing centres, most of them will have work until the autumn. HIGHWAY WORK The resumption of work on the Trans-Canada highway, and on new roads in the National Park as well as a great amount of maintenance work on secondary roads, will further absorb many men in the immediate future. Because of the new regulations bringing fishermen under the coverage of the Unemployment Insurance Act, hundreds of fishermen are carrying Unemployment insurance books for the first time, and they will be eligible to draw benefits as of January 1st next. It is expected that as a result of the new amendments, the number of Unemployment Insurance claims which will be filed next winter, will be considerably increased over the present year. The work in the Local Office will be correspondingly greater than ever before.

### Supports Pearson Supervision Plan

MANCHESTER, England (Reuters)—The Manchester Guardian says it supports a United Nations "peace supervision force" suggested recently by External Affairs Minister L. B. Pearson of Canada. Commenting on an article by Pearson in Foreign Affairs, the Liberal newspaper says that the threat of force by a single outside power in the Middle East is "unlikely to work." "It is of the highest importance that members of the United Nations should be ready to act when the time comes," it says. Under Pearson's "modest" proposal, the Guardian says, member states—other than the great powers—would be asked to contribute forces to the peace supervision force, and the smaller powers on the security council would be expected to do so. The secretary-general would have a permanent military adviser with a small staff and the terms on which the force would enter any one country would be agreed upon internationally in advance.
