

Canadian Soldiers To Get Atomic Detection Devices

OTTAWA (CP)—The army has left no doubt that it is determined to be fully prepared for atomic warfare.

It was learned Wednesday that every Canadian soldier will be issued with an atomic radiation detection device known as a dosimeter.

In fact, the army has settled on two types of dosimeters for service issue. No contracts have yet been let but the army has set aside funds for dosimeter purchase.

One type will be worn by every soldier and form part of his medical record. It will be read by experts after the soldier has been in atomic battle or test to determine whether he has been subjected to too much radiation.

The other, pencil-like type will be carried by officers and senior non-commissioned officers to determine the amount of radiation in a unit's immediate area. Still other, bulkier types will be carried by expert atomic teams in "feeling out" an area for radio-

activity to determine dangerous or safe—"hot" or "cool"—zones.

SERIES OF MOVIES
Decision to acquire dosimeters is the latest in a series of moves to prepare the army for the hazards of the atomic battlefield.

Others are:

1. The combined chiefs of staff have recommended to the government development and acquisition of an army transport plane, known as the "flying truck," to give the army more mobility in the field.
2. For at least two years the army has been working out atomic tactics on paper and in the field, both in exercises at home and in Europe.
3. Atomic training teams now are giving instruction to selected officers and NCOs in the army's five commands on radiation detection. The latter, in turn, will pass on the knowledge to all army units, both regular and militia.
4. The army is striving for better field communications, most vital key to controlled mobility.
5. It is also working on clothing which would give at least some

protection against radiation.

OTHER PROGRAMS
The navy and RCAF are also carrying out radiation detection training programs. However, it appears unlikely every sailor would require a dosimeter, a defence department spokesman said.

Several radiation readings on a ship would cover the entire crew.

The navy's new destroyer escorts can be closed up against atomic radiation and their decks washed down automatically with a single sailor having to go on deck.

While the army awaits its full supply of dosimeters—one trouble is that they are still being developed and few are being manufactured—it has some for training purposes.

Dosimeters are fairly cheap. One used for training at the Civil Defence College at Arnprior, Ont., costs about 55 cents. It looks like a pencil, clips on the pocket in the same way and the wearer can determine the amount of radiation in his immediate area by peering through the end of it at a scale.

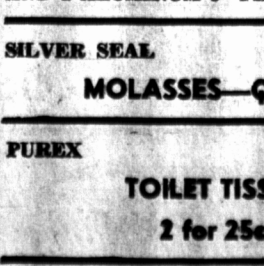

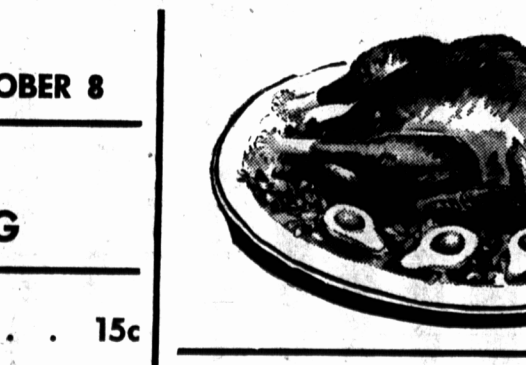
