AGAINST RACE WAR.

THE efforts of Mr. Tarte and his paid papers to raise a race and religious war in Quebec as they did when Reil and Mercier were in the political field, have been renewed with redoubled energy as polling day approaches. Recently an incendiary pamphlet filled with inflammatory matter calculated to rouse the quick passions of our honest French-Canadian brethren was distributed broadcast throughout Quebec. In reply to this, Liberal-Conservative French-Canadians have issued a leaflet as follows:

"Finding the French-Canadians rising in their might to overthrow the Tarte Government, the Liberals have printed and issued at the last hour, on the very eve of an election, a pamphlet intended to arouse unthinking masses to the frenzy of a mob in the hope of carrying them to the ballot boxes blinded by racial prejudice. There never was a more deliberate attempt to raise a veritable race war, and which if persisted in can scarcely end in anything but open rebellion or annexation.

"It is the work of men driven by despair, and who, rather than risk the will of the people at the polls, descend to the wretched expedient of arousing, by inflammatory appeals and imaginary stories, the worst passions that human beings can be guilty of. As the Boxer element in China roused to deeds of violence and bloodshed, so the Liberals in this pamphlet seek to dethrone reason and intelligence, and to drive our people of the province to acts they may regret all their lives.

"Tarte and Blair and Sifton think they can deceive us French-Canadians, but led them beware.

"The French-Canadians are finding out that Mr. Tarte, who was a poor man in 1896, is now rich and lives luxuriously. He and his Liberal Government have made life dear for the poor man. Clothing, coal oil, groceries, hardware, furniture, coal, everything is dearer now than when the Conservatives were in power. Tarte thinks by exciting us, the French-Canadians, on the race question, he will make us forget the extravagance of the Liberal Government, the corruption of the Liberal Government, the scandals of the Liberal Government. Tarte and Blair and Sifton think if they can only entrap the people into giving them another term any device or stratagem will do, and then they can snap their fingers at the people. Blair has grown suddenly rich, and is buying for his house the finest pictures and works of art in Europe. Sifton rejoices in a princely expenditure in his own way.

"All these men were poor men four short years ago. Now they are growing rich by leaps and bounds.

"Laurier has no say, no power, no influence over these men, and has become their tool.

"The outlook is black unless the people use the only remedy open to a free people.

"French-Canadians, beware. Do not let Tarte deceive us.

"Sir Charles Tupper, Hon. George Foster, Hugh John Macdonald, Hon. T. C. Casgrain, J. G. H. Bergeron, Sir Adolphe Caron, Hon. A. O. Taitton, Hon. T. C. Chapais and other leading Conservatives have spoken throughout Quebec, Ontario, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia. Have these men uttered one word in Quebec that they have not repeated in the other provinces? Have they uttered one word in the English provinces that they have not uttered in Quebec before French-Canadian audiences? Not one.

"Why is this?
"Because these Conservatives, reared in the Macdonald-Cartier school, are statesmen, not unpatriotic politicians.

"We French-Canadians want to live on terms of friendship with our English-speaking fellow-citizens. We want to trade together, we want to work for each other, and we want to make Canada a grand country.

"In the United States the Americans—French, Germans, Swiss, Austrians, Russians, Italians—all live in peace together and make their country great and their people happy.

"Let us do so in Canada, and we will get more that is good out of our lives."

In this connection, forty-seven French-speaking Liberal-Conservative candidates in the province of Quebec have issued a letter breathing peace and harmony and calling upon their French-Canadian fellow country-men to "stop and think before giving way to the passions that Mr. Tarte and the Liberals with him in Quebec are striving to ex-

cite." They add truly that the inflammatory pamphlet referred to is "not the work of men who are friends of French-Canadians—or any Canadians." It is hoped that their peaceful appeal will counteract the Tarteian attempts to excite hatred among peoples destined to live and die together,—peoples who ought to be allowed freedom and peace harmoniously to develop a great Northern Nationality in this Canada of ours.

WHY?

SIR LOUIS DAVIES misrepresented the point made by Mr. Stewart last evening, concerning reciprocity. The question raised by Mr. Stewart is, why did the Government imperil reciprocity of trade with the United States by involving it with the Alaskan boundary question? Why not have settled the matter of trade with the States by reference only to trade questions? The question of the international boundary is properly separate and distinct from that of trade. Why were the two mixed up? Mr. Stewart made a decided hit—and Sir Louis but a poor attempt to break its force.

SIR LOUIS knows now what it is to face a hostile electorate. It must be confessed that he puts the best possible face on it.

THE hearty cheers for Stewart last evening were tokens of the people's disapproval of a Government by which they have been deceived and disappointed.

WHEN Sir Louis Davies goes to one place he hears that there are defections from his cause in another place. For Sir Louis the worst of it is, these reports are true.

BOTH speakers got a good hearing in the Market Hall last evening. But, in numbers and enthusiasm, Mr. Stewart's supporters were away ahead,—as they will be on election day.

"I wish to maintain the present order of things only so long as Canada is not strong enough to become a nation."—Israel Tarte at Laval, from report in La Patrie.

THE best friends of Sir Louis Davies regret that he is in with such unscrupulous and extravagant men as Tarte, Sifton and Blair. For this reason many of them will quietly mark their ballots for Mr. Stewart.

TARTE'S maritime excursion, with the tri-color at the mast-head, and all kinds of luxuries on board,—charged to the current account of P. E. Island wharves—was too much for loyal and economical Liberals in this Province. Sir Louis and his friends will suffer on account of it.

WE are informed that a determined attempt was made by four or five supporters of Mr. D. A. McKinnon (headed by the local M. L. A.) to break up the meeting at Vernon River Bridge last night, after Mr. McKinnon had addressed the meeting. It is needless to say that the scheme did not succeed. Such tactics are adding votes to Mr. Martin's already long list, by the score.

AN esteemed correspondent has sent THE EXAMINER an extended report of the meeting held at Montague Bridge on the 29th Oct. We regret that space for it cannot be found to-day. It appears that the Government party's large promises and little performances were exposed in good style by Mr. A. C. Macdonald, Mr. Murdoch McKinnon, M.

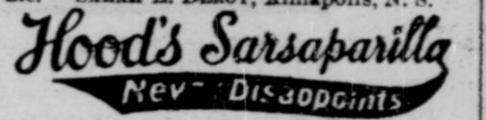
