IMUNIZATION CLINICS IN RURAL SCHOOLS

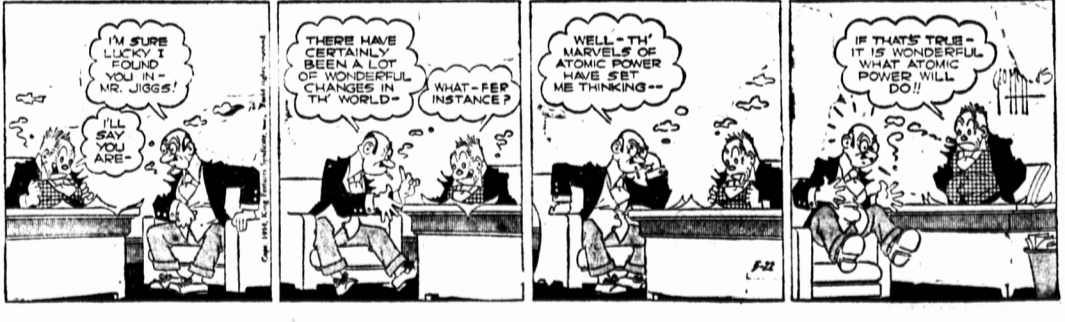
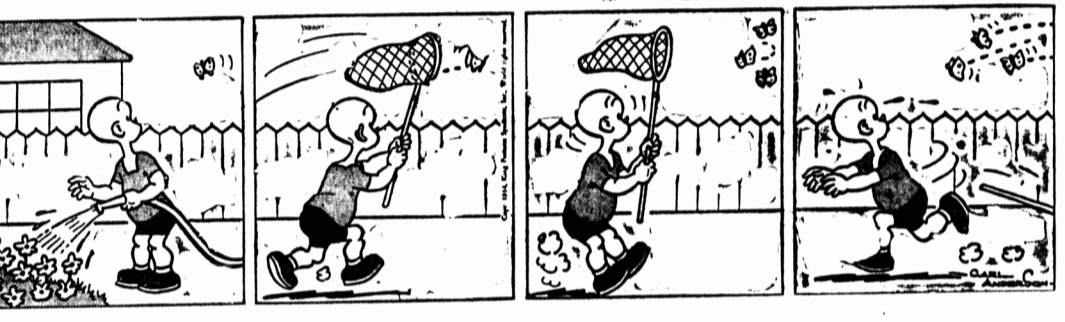
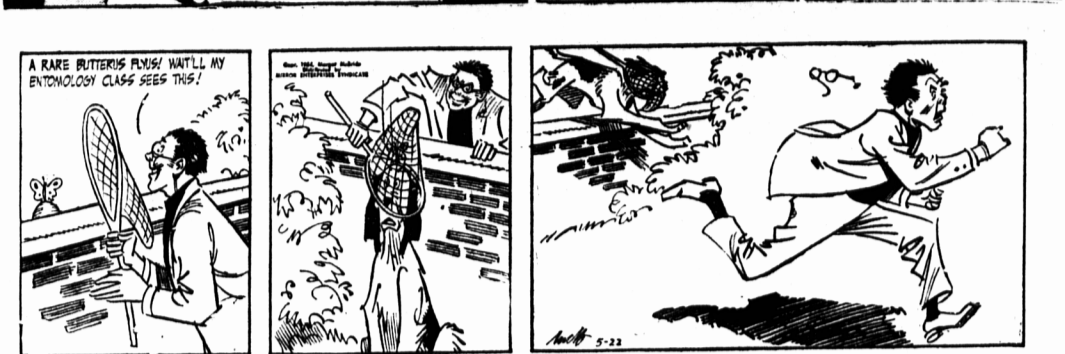
