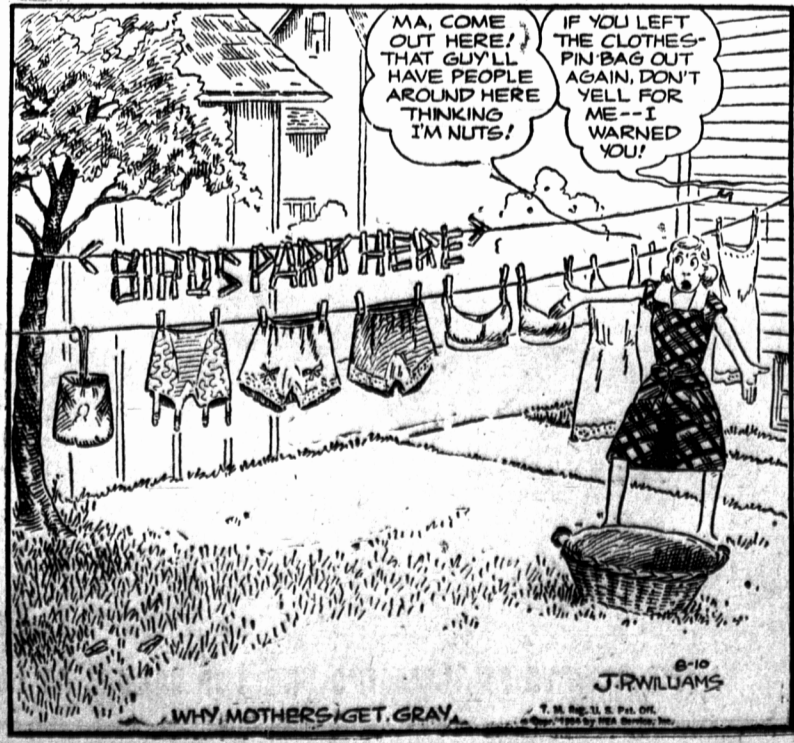

Red Cross Girl Leaving For Far East Packs Date Dresses With Uniforms

TORONTO, (CP)—Kay Dyson, Red Cross worker scheduled to leave Aug. 18 for the Far East, is packing lots of date dresses among her uniforms.

Dating is definitely not taboo among Red Cross workers and soldiers stationed in Japan, she says. It is part of the job of morale boosting.

Hospital visiting and work in places such as the Maple Leaf Club, a recreational club for Canadian troops, will comprise her main duties. With her short chestnut hair and sparkling eyes, she will be a welcome sight to soldiers homesick for a bit of Canada.

Twenty-eight-year-old Miss Dyson began her career with the Red Cross during the Second World War while studying modern languages at University of Toronto. A minimum of 80 hours of war work was required for her degree, so she signed up as a Red Cross volunteer.

Her first big job was escorting war brides from Halifax inland. Her most interesting experience was two trips made on the Samaria in 1948 escorting immigrants. Seventeen nationalities were represented and, although she speaks French, German and a bit of Spanish, translating and interpreting got confusing at times and the conversationalists resorted to sign language.

She settled down in her hometown Toronto and became a paid staff member, acting as Secretary to the Toronto detachment of the Red Cross corps. Even though she was employed full time with the corps, she kept up volunteer work, piling up 280 hours.

As a volunteer she has met many injured men sent home from Korea to Sunnybrook Military Hospital.

"Usually the planes come in at three in the morning," she said. "It got to be quite a joke but they were always in good spirits and delighted to be home even at that hour."
