## Queens Member Returns From Interesting Tour

An interesting first-hand study of the United States system of government and its defense efforts was made by Mr. J. Angus MacLean, Conservative M. P. for Queens, as a member of a group of eleven parliamentarians from Nato countries, in a tour which concluded in New York on December 10.

Mr. MacLean was chosen one of two members of the Canadian Parliament to make the tour, his companion being Mr. Rene Jutra, Liberal representative for Provencher, Manitoba. Other members of the party included one each from England, Norway, Denmark and Iceland, three from Italy, and two from France. The tour was arranged by the U.S. Departments of State and National Defense, and the visitors were accompanied by two U.S. State department officials, a guide and an interpreter.

Mr. MacLean, who has now returned home, describes the tour as a most interesting and educational one. The party assembled at New York on Nov. 27, and visited Boston, Albany, Des Moines, Chicago, Norfolk, Va., and Washington. During the tour they met the Governors of four States and exchanged many interesting views on legislative practice and procedure.

The entire tour was made by air and Mr. MacLean was greatly impressed by the efficiency and despatch with which details were handled.

## FORMER DAYS OF OLD OPERA AT PRINCE EDWARD

With the destruction by fire of his life time. The theatre was first used as a moving picture house in 1908. It was run by a group of local citizens who continued for about a year and finally closed out. The "Wonderland" (now the Empire Theatre) was opened by McGinnis and McGarrill who subsequently disposed of their interests to a Mr. McCoy of Montreal. He later sold to another group of Charlottetown citizens.

In 1915 F.G. Spencer purchased the "Wonderland" and some few weeks later purchased the interests of the General Film Company who operated the Opera House. It was since continued to operate the two theatres along with the Capitol Theatre on the corner of Great George and Grafton Streets.

In the early movie going days the admission was Five Cents for a three reel feature, illustrated song and usually an orchestra. At times when the price was raised to Ten Cents, the story is told a patron would come to the ticket booth and put down his five cents but when told that the admission was ten cents, he would remark "There must be something special on tonight", and in some instances withdraw his nickel and go on his way.
