## Three Accused Are Remanded

SUMMERSIDE — Three men entered pleas of guilty to charges of break, entry and theft before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Court yesterday morning.

William Thane Shea, 26, Leonard Francis Richard, 21, both of Tignish and Roy John Callaghan, 20, St. Louis, were charged with breaking into the Tignish liquor store on March 24, and taking an amount of liquor. All three had elected trial by magistrate.

RCMP Constable J.F. Greer of the Alberton Detachment told the court that the break was discovered by Constable Robert May, Tignish town policeman, who notified the RCMP.

The RCMP constable added that when Cpl. W. Wilson NCO in charge of Alberton detachment, arrived on the scene he found Callaghan seated inside the building drinking a "quart of scotch".

Twelve bottles were removed from the building, he said and a case of Long John Scotch whiskey was found by the broken window where it had been left because it had been found too large to pass through the window opening.

Richard and Shea, who had assisted Callaghan through the window which was some 15 feet from the ground, left the scene when they noticed the town constable approaching the building. They were later apprehended while seated in a car in the town.

The three accused have no previous criminal records and Const. Greer told the court that they had given statements to the police and also assisted in re-

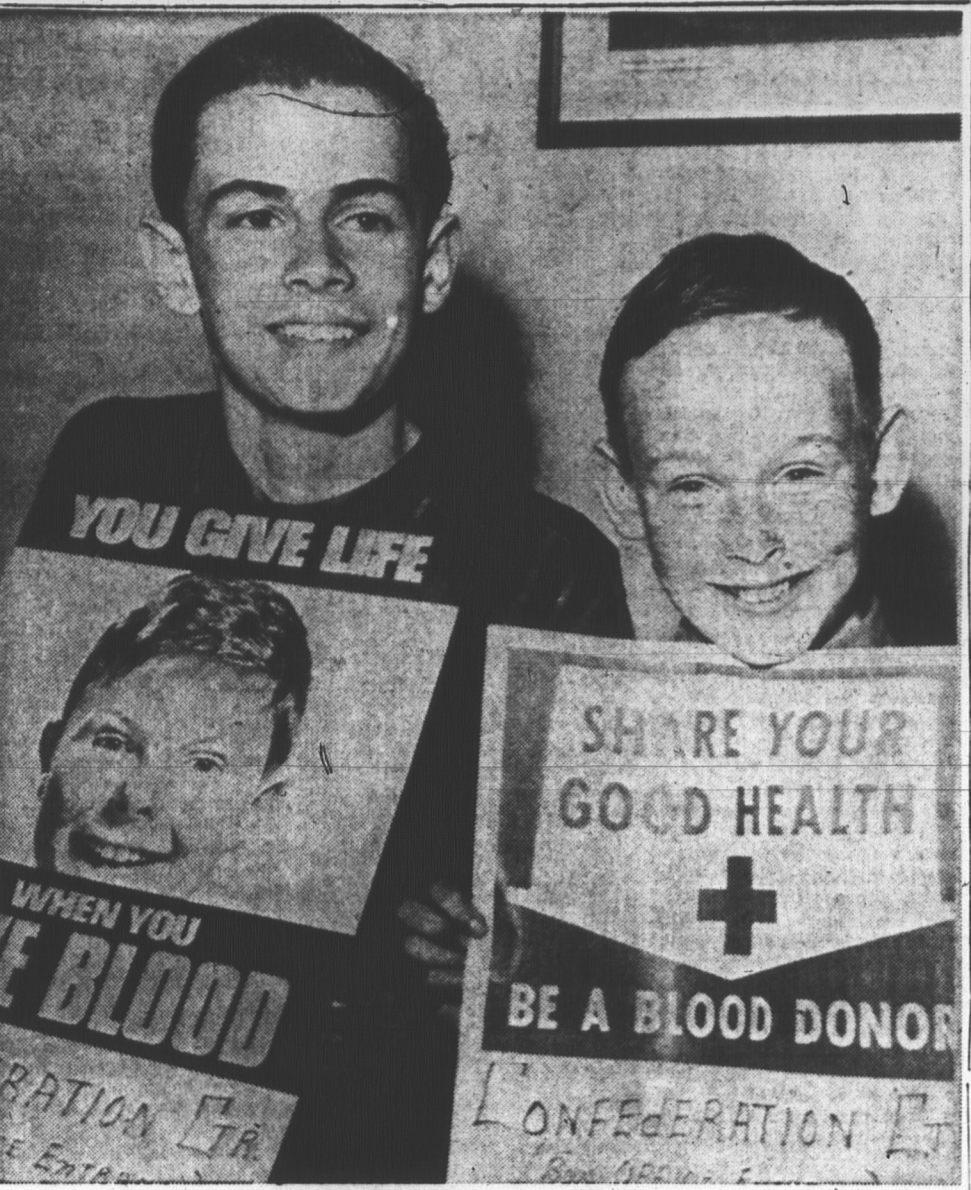

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## Harbor Ice Is Moved Out

GEORGETOWN — Georgetown Harbor is once again ice-free, with the ice having moved out several days ago. It was late in February before the Harbor froze over and no thickness of ice formed.

Activity among the fishermen is beginning to pick up in preparation for the opening of the lobster fishing season on May 1st.

A number of fishermen have already commenced working on their boats, which are hauled up along the waterfront. This for many is a major task, as boats have to be scraped, painted and have minor or major repairs made.

Piles of new traps, which have been built indoors, during the past few months are now making their appearance as they are piled outside in preparation to transporting them to the various wharves, where they will be piled by the thousands in readiness for the season opening.

It is not anticipated that ice will be any problem this season, as was the case last season, when Gulf ice came in after the season opened and thousands of traps had to be taken in and many hundreds were smashed in the shallower waters of some of the reefs.

The first herring net was set in Georgetown Harbour on Monday by Georgetown's youngest fisherman, Glen Llewellyn, who hopes to land the first herring of the new season. Herring fishing

for lobster bait at one time was an important part of the fisherman's activities but of late years the herring have not been frequenting this area in any large quantities and most fishermen now buy their bait, which is very often brought here by ship or truck.

## Georgetown Club Completes Visits
