YESTERDAY'S NEWS IS CONFIRMED

BUT NO OFFICIAL STATEMENT YET MADE.

President Kruger has Escaped from Pretoria—Boers Said to be Trekking to Lydenburg—Wires between Pretoria and Lorenzo Marques Cut.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

GOOD NEWS CONFIRMED.

LONDON, June 1.—The Daily Mail says that it has received despatches from its correspondents at Pretoria completely confirming Lord Rosslyn's despatch announcing the imminent fall of the capital of the Transvaal.

RUNDLE'S VICTORY.

CAPS TOWN, June 1.—General Rundle has defeated the Boer commando at Senekal. His casualties were 45 killed and many wounded.

THE SITUATION.

LONDON, June 1.—Belated messages from Pretoria confirm the reports of the departure of President Kruger with his cabinet and officials on Tuesday night, and the selection of a committee to administer the city provisionally.

Since these telegrams left on Wednesday, nothing, apparently, has reached Lorenzo Marques by telegraph from Pretoria.

Possibly the wires have been cut. Although the War Office has not received a word about it, no one in London harbors an idea that the Boer capital is not already in the hands of the British or about to be.

Their possession of Johannesburg, at all events, as Lord Roberts has telegraphed, is a fact.

The present seat of the Boer Government, according to a despatch from Lorenzo Marques, is Middleturg; but it will be probably chiefly further east. The Boers lately confronting Lord Roberts appear to have gone eastward, also toward the Lydenburg region.

The defenders of Laing's Nek, when their position becomes too perilous, will probably trek straight northward toward Lydenburg.

When this concentration takes place there will be possibly 20,000 men who may hold out for a time with the scattered bands of guerillas elsewhere.

The press despatches from the headquarters of Lord Roberts give no estimate as to the number of Boers who were fighting General French and General Ian Hamilton on Monday and Tuesday last; but they all agree that the Boers retired and that the British casualties were slight. Some discussion is going on in London as to what will be done with President Kruger if he is captured. One idea is that he will be sent to St. Helena, another that he will be tried for treason.
