THE MAILS.—There were mails to and from the Island yesterday. The ice boats left Cape Traverse at 7.30 a. m., and reached Tormentine at 12.15. The boats left Cape Tormentine at 7.25, with 94 sacks of mail and landed at Cape Traverse at 11.30. Thirty-seven sacks were left behind and these, with the mail that will come down by special train from Sackville this morning, will be brought over to-day. The 37 bags of papers, etc., left behind yesterday in the only Island mail still on the mainland. Two full days' mail, Friday's and Saturday's, was received by the Minto yesterday morning and distributed to all parts of the province throughout the day. The ice at the Capes is very heavy and moving practically no open water yesterday and say they could have walked across.

BAPTIST SERVICES

THE MAN WHO STOPPED HALF WAY.

There was a large audience again at the Baptist Church last night. Rev. L. E. Ackland preached a sermon of much power on "The Man Who Stopped Half Way." The Male Quartette of the Church sang in fine form. It was their first appearance in public and it will not be their last. The meeting for the boys and girls was held in the School Room yesterday afternoon and it was well attended. There was a good interest last night. Mr. Ackland is preaching a strong, manly gospel. It has the right ring.

He said in part: Terah is one of the little known characters of the Bible. His whole biography is written in Genesis 11-31-32. With wonderful skill the sacred writer has told all that was worth telling of this life, its strength and weakness in these two verses.

Terah was a man of vision. He went out from Ur of the Chaldees to go to Canaan. Some vision lured him on to the new land, his great unknown West. He followed his vision. He made sacrifices for it. A grandfather with a grown-up grandson he had much of the vigor and dash and abandonment of youth that attempts new enterprises and ventures new beginnings. With all these fine characteristics why did not Terah receive the honors that were given to his great son Abraham? Why was it necessary for God to withhold the promises and covenants of grace till another generation had come upon the stage? Simply because Terah stopped in Haran. He set out for Canaan but he went only half way.

There are many half-way houses on the journey of life that lure people to stop and rest and they never reach their Canaan. There is the half-way house of respectability. Many are content to remain there. They pay their debts and dress well, they move in good society, but they feel no passion for service, they catch no vision of true manhood. Hell will be full of respectable people. The Pharisees of Jesus' time were most respectable and respected, but Jesus called them whitened sepulchres, and found more of appreciation among the outcast publicans and sinners than among the respectable people. Another half-way house is a profession that is never followed up. Let the Psalmist's attitude be ours, "My soul followed hard after God."

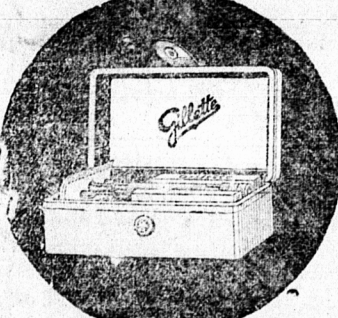

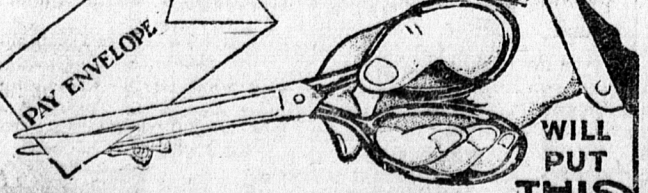
