O'Leary. A short service was held

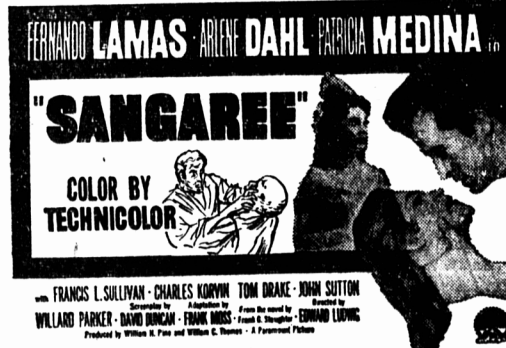
