Bunny Ahearne Is Right Man

Rumour has it that the National Hockey League is seeking discreetly for a new president as present boss of affairs, Clarence Campbell has expressed a desire to take leave of his chores.

While in the process of weeding out candidates for the new mentor it would be a good idea if they took a long hard look at Bunny Ahearne, current president of the International Ice Hockey Federation. It is a question whether Ahearne would accept the position if he were approached for he has long been in conflict with the pro leagues but he is a man with definite ideas for the improvement of the hockey world and is not afraid to speak his mind. Certainly no one would push him around for he has stood for years the assaults of assorted national hockey associations.

Recent Ahearne termed the notion that the Russians join the NHL as ridiculous and he went on to point out that the pro can't even manage their own league. Year after year there have been only four contenders in the race for the silverware and it is mainly due to the fact that these four clubs can't, or won't, supply help to the weaker sisters. He also battered his head futilely attempting to get the NHL to aid the National teams produced in this country.

He has also come up with a suggestion which, if he had an opportunity to effect would revolutionize the art of refereeing. Ahearne suggests that the referees be suspended over the ice in a gondola type affair. This is an excellent suggestion for as hockey followers know they get to see a lot of things on their TV camera that the refs appear to miss at ice level. Then too the move would allow good thinking men who can not skate to take part in the game.

Coaches such as Funch Imlach who stated Saturday that it was just wasting money to pay ref Udvari, Tom Blake who drew a 2,000 fine for assaulting a ref and the other coaches who have all at one time or another drawn fines for abusing the refs would save themselves a bit of money for the refs would be out of reach. However that is incidental. The main point is that the referees could see the entire play and act accordingly as well as the fact that the standard of refereeing could be improved.

This is Ahearne's brainstrom and if he could come up with a few others like it he would be the ideal man for the new NHL presidency for he has more than proved in the past that he can make hockey go.

UNIVERSITY BREAKS ICE

It's not too likely that Simon Fraser University athletic teams are beheld with joy by the rest of the coaches in the Western Intercollegiate Athletic conference.

For Simon Fraser, a brand spanking new university has opened the road for athletic scholarships in Canada. The plans of the university do not include Canadian opponents. President Gordon Schrumm said recently that in a very few years SF will be facing the major schools of the US's Pacific Coast league in both basketball and football.

The university is currently offering 'athletic assistance' in the sports of swimming, football and basketball. Every member of each team is granted the same subsidy and Schrumm feels that this keeps the boys happy as one or two of the big stars are not getting better payments.

This marks the first advance into really big time sport for a Canadian college and the results should be interesting. Canadian pro football teams will likely be watching the results with anxiety for it is conceivable that these will be the players that stock their teams in the future. Should Canadian Universities as a whole decide to come out and grant athletic scholarships as such, instead of this continual dealing under the table, all sports would benefit.

Saints Varsity Leave Today

The St. Dunstan's University Hockey Club, with a record of two wins and two losses in regular MHL play, face their toughest weekend of the year with back to back games against U.N.B. Red Devils and St. Thomas Tommies at Fredericton. It will be the second and third game in only five nights for the Saints, having played and lost to St. Francis at home on Tuesday night.

Toronto Tramples Habs; Black Hawks Knot Bruins

MONTREAL (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs ended a three-game losing streak with a vengeance here Thursday night as they scored once in the first period, twice in the second and three times in the final frame to blank Montreal Canadiens 6-0 in a National Hockey League game.

Despite the Leafs' prolific scoring spurge, individual game honors were earned by 41-year-old Johnny Bower in the nets. Bower registered the first shutout by a Toronto-goaler this season and individually recorded his 27th in NHL regular season play.

Bower earned the shutout by turning back 40 Montreal shots—37 of them in the final period.

Individual scoring honors went to left-winger Frank Mahovlich with a goal and two assists and Eddie Shack and Wally Boyer who each accounted for a goal and one assist.

For Mahovlich it was his 12th season goal, while Shack earned his 15th and Boyer his fourth. Defencemen Larry Hillman and Marcel Pronovost both netted their first goals of the season and Leonard (Red) Kelly scored his fourth of the year to round out the scoring.

FANS CHEER LEAFS—By the mid-point of the final period, the 15,162 hometown fans became so disenchanted with the disorganized efforts of the Canadiens that the Forum resounded to the chant of "go Leafs go" for prolonged periods.

Toronto's win moved the Leafs to within five points of Detroit Red Wings and Canadiens, tied for second place with 42 points, four less than first-place Chicago Black Hawks.

Leafs have dominated Canadiens in four visits to the Forum this year, and now hold a 3-1 edge in games played. In Toronto the clubs have each won a game and tied one.

Shack opened the scoring with only 21 seconds elapsed in the first period, as he took the puck from Montreal defenceman Jean-Guy Talbot just inside the Montreal blue line.

Talbot fell on the play and Shack skated in alone on Lorne (Gump) Worsley in the Montreal net. He deked Worsley with a neat shift and backhanded the puck past the sprawled Montreal goaltender.

Hillman's goal came at 8:29 of the second period—one second before Montreal winger Claude Larose was due to return to the ice after serving a cross-checking penalty.

SLIPS UNDER LEGS—The Toronto defenceman wound up with a shot from 10 feet outside the Montreal blue line. Worsley appeared to have the puck blocked in his pads, but it slipped between his legs into the net.

Pronovost made it 3-0 at 18:24

as he beat Worsley from the right face-off circle with a backhand shot after taking a pass from Dave Keon.

Boyer gave the Leafs a four-goal margin at 8:15 of the final period when he combined with Mahovlich and defenceman Alan Stanley to beat Worsley.

BOSTON (AP)—Lowly Boston Bruins shakked Chicago scoring ace Bobby Hull and earned a 1-1 National Hockey League tie with first-place Black Hawks Thursday night on Ted Green's third period goal.

Green connected for his third goal of the season with a 45-foot screen shot after a pass from Johnny Bucyk at 7:26 of the final, offsetting a Chicago power play tally by Phil Esposito in the first period.

The Hawks dominated the action in the opening period as they unloaded 15 shots compared with eight by the Bruins. However, the Bruins took charge and more than held their own in the final two periods.

Hull, who leads the NHL with 32 goals and needs only four more to reach the 300 mark in his seventh season—has 31 games left to play—was carefully guarded by Boston wing Ed Westfall, a converted defenceman.

MANAGED ONE SHOT—Hull managed to get away only one shot on goal, a weak flip from the blue line in the second period.

Hull and Westfall were sent off for a highsticking duel at 5:38 and were penalized together again at 15:57. Hull was banished for holding-late in the middle session.
