Present in attendance: A report was heard from Brig. W. J. Reid, who represented the P.E.I. group at the recent planning meeting in Moncton, N.B., concerning the third annual Maritime Conference on Cerebral Palsy. The conference will be held at Pine Hill Divinity College, Halifax, on June 7, 8 and 9th of next year. The theme of the conference will be "Planning the Future of the Cerebral Palsied Child" and will be concerned in part with the vocational and social integration of the cerebral palsied person as he enters adulthood.

The teacher, Mrs. Doris Worth, gave a report on behalf of the equipment committee. The donation of a wheelchair and typewriter for the Centre was gratefully accepted from the Junior Red Cross. The purchase of other new equipment and teaching aids was also discussed.

A committee was established to investigate the cost of transporting the children to the Provincial Rehabilitation Centre for their physiotherapy treatments. It is hoped that some source of funds will be found to cover this ever-increasing expense.

Among other matters discussed were the new "Register for Handicapped Children" which is being developed by the Rehabilitation Council of P.E.I., plans for Christmas and the problems involved in helping Cerebral Palsied children living in rural areas.
