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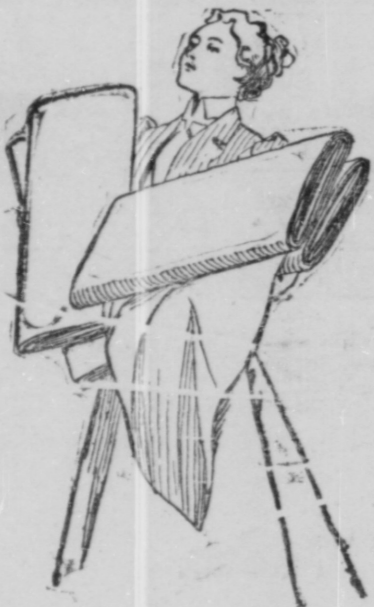

THE KAISER'S GAINS.

THAT there was something more in the Kaiser's visit to Jerusalem than a desire for mere show and notoriety, something more, even, than a pious wish to visit the birthplace of Christianity, is now evident. The results of the Imperial mission are very tangible and real. French authority in Palestine established on the protectorate over all Catholics residing there or traveling thither, existing for centuries and lately reaffirmed by the Pope, has been upset by the Kaiser's assertion of his right to protect German Catholics. Speaking at Jerusalem to a body of the latter he said: "Whenever one of you needs my protection I am here. Let him come to me, no matter what his creed may be. Happily the German Empire is in a position to afford its subjects abroad effective protection." The significance of the snub to France is accentuated by the last sentence here quoted. In the Ottoman Empire, as well as in China, Wilhelm II has made his influence felt. By the cordial relations that have been established between the Sultan and the Kaiser the position of Germany among the nations has been distinctly strengthened. Turkey alone may not count for much; but Turkey with Germany at its back is a distinct force in opposition to the aggressions of Russia, and in this regard the interests of Germany and Turkey run together. The Turkish frontier is to be strengthened by a line of German railway which is to unite the Sea of Marmora and the Persian Gulf. On the other hand, the projected lines of railway to be built from the Persian Gulf to Scutari and from Bagdad to the Mediterranean will give Germany commercial supremacy in Asia Minor. But the Kaiser's masterstroke has been made in respect to his Catholic subjects in Germany and to the Pope. The "Catholic Centre" holds the balance of power in the Reichstag and its support or opposition is of importance in the carrying out of the Kaiser's schemes. The Kaiser has, besides gratifying the Pope, laid this body under obligations—sentimental, it is true, but none the less strong—by presenting to the Pope in the name of the German Catholics, the abode of the Blessed Virgin. Clearly, the reigning Kaiser, Wilhelm II, is, notwithstanding his occasional vagaries, an able and far-seeing man.

ANOTHER RUSSIAN MOVE.

It is stated that the country of the Shah is sinking lower and lower, without money, without credit and without enterprise. Orientalists who know Persia well predict that the day is now soon coming when Russia will complete her conquest of the country and absorb at least the northern portion. Russia's policy has long since pointed to this outcome. He has excluded Northern Persia from the benefits of free commercial intercourse with the outside world by means of prohibitive transit dues upon all goods brought through Russia and destined for Persia. Russia further controls, by special concession granted by the late Shah, the building of railroads and highways in that section. She has thus been able to absolutely defeat all progressive movements unopposed by her. The situation is of particular interest at this time, since Persia is but a link in the great Russian chain which is being slowly, but surely, welded around Asia. When the time comes, a net of railways will be rapidly spread throughout Northern Persia, connecting with the system of the trunk lines of the Empire. That day will mean the regeneration of Persia along Russian lines with Russian civilization and Russian money, and as no other alternative is in sight the poor Persian, it is said, will welcome it.

EXCLUSION RESENTED.

So long as the United States was a self-contained nation outsiders had no right to raise a row because her Customs tariff was prohibitive in respect to many articles. But now that she essays the position of a Great Power among the nations, with suzerainty and colonies in lands beyond the sea, other powers are likely to object if she extend her prohibitions to distant markets and turn the people of other nations out of a field of enterprise in which they have heretofore been able to compete. Thus, we note that the British press and people share the feeling of chagrin and disappointment expressed by the Canadian press and people over the loss of the market in Porto Rico, caused by the application of a United States prohibition tariff. "There is," we are told, "the highest reason for repeating that an American expansion which means hide-bound protectionism in American colonies has no attractions, but quite the reverse for the great bulk of Englishmen." "Such methods" it is stated, "must effectually kill that Anglo-American alliance of which the British Ministers have made themselves warm advocates. No responsible, seriously-minded Englishman will support an alliance so contrary to English traditions and political and commercial freedom."

Nations, like men, must be friendly if they would have friends. The United States will speedily lose the sympathy of the world if she continues to pursue her selfish commercial policy in respect to her colonies.

"BANEFUL LEGISLATION."

THE Council of the Montreal Board of Trade have forwarded to the Governor-General in Council a petition for the disallowance of the act of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, passed last session, entitled: "An Act in Amendment of the Evidence Act." The grounds upon which the protest against this act are based, are:

(a) That it is most unrighteous in that it provides dishonest traders in that province with a method whereby they can legally repudiate payment of their just debts; (b) that it is an unlawful attempt to enforce payment of the most undesirable tax on commercial travellers provided by 'An Act to Impose a Direct Tax on Certain Classes of Traders,' and (c) that in its effect upon the holders of promissory notes for goods sold in Prince Edward Island said law is believed to be in opposition to the rights given by Dominion legislation to the holders of such notes."

Upon these grounds the Montreal Board of Trade begs the Governor-General in Council to "protect traders in other Provinces from the effects of such baneful legislation." The pity is that the grounds are strong.

It is said that among the features of the report of the commission appointed by the President to devise a government for Hawaii is a provision for the election of a delegation to Congress similar to the provision for the election of delegates from our Territories. Harper's Weekly points out that unless the natives are disfranchised, this delegate will probably be one of themselves, and then we shall have the edifying spectacle of the American politician cultivating the native vote of the Sandwich Islands. We never believed, continues Harper's Weekly, that the Americans of the Islands would retain their power very long after annexation, and the signs are beginning to multiply that their lease of power is short.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It is stated that the Torrens System of conveyancing will soon be introduced into British Columbia.

—Ex-Queen Liliokalani, of Hawaii maintains that despite the annexation of the Hawaiian Island to the United States, the Crown lands are her absolute private property, and she is about visiting Washington to try to influence Congress to allow her to retain possession of the Crown lands, valued at \$5,000,000.

—The Toronto Globe is able to show that a large number of factories in Toronto are adding to their plant; and the St. John Sun says: "On examining the list we observe that they are all industries whose tariff protection has either been continued as it was or increased by the present government."

—After the Winnipeg association at its annual meeting turned down the Sifton candidates for office, a special meeting was called to get a resolution of confidence in Mr Sifton passed. The vote was carried on a division of 67 to 36. From this it appears that where Mr Sifton is best known more than a third of the active Liberal workers are against him. The Montreal Gazette remarks that the lead that results in that state of affairs is a lead to ruin.
