Six members paid dues. All bills were asked to be paid. Meeting closed with the act of consecration to the Blessed Virgin by the president.

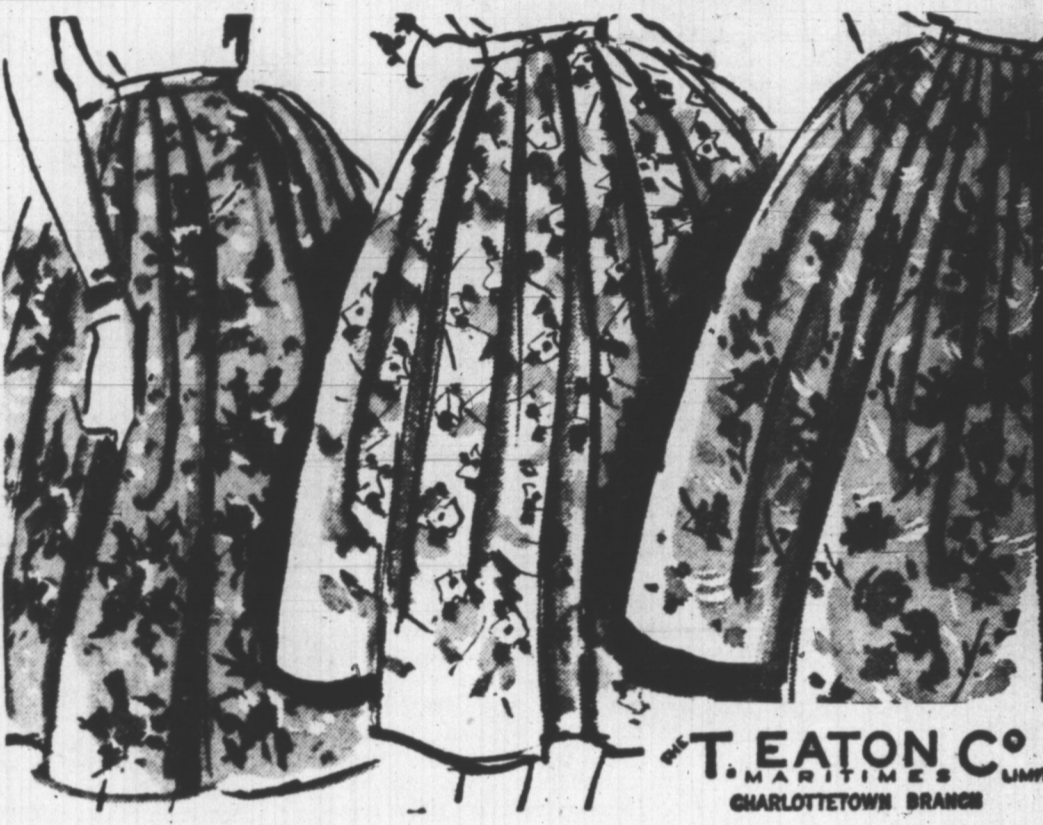
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MR. AND MRS. C. N. CAISSIE Nuptial Vows Are Pledged At St. James RC Church

TODAY'S TREAT

CLAM PATTIES
2 cups fresh clams
1 cup bread crumbs (dry)
1/4 tsp. pepper
2 eggs
2 tbs. cream
2 tbs. flour

Method: Mince clams, add bread crumbs and seasoning. Break in eggs and stir thoroughly. Add cream and flour. Heat bacon dripping in frying pan and drop in mixture by spoonfuls, shaping with the spoon. Cook until golden brown on both sides.
