Canadian Glycer Pilot Won Diamond 'C' Award

EDMONTON, CAN. — Ross Grady, Dan's Power's pilot who flew a Cessna 170B, got his start in the sport when friends talked him into building a glider in his garage.

Grady, an easy-going 32-year-old father of three, has spent years flying powered aircraft. He flew a single-engine Tiger Moth of the Edmonton Flying Club when he was 15, but some how it wasn't enough.

In 1957 two friends persuaded him to build a glider. He had a low-performance medium sail plane. He used it for a while, and materials gathered around Edmonton.

On May 19, 1963, Grady flew a high-performance sailplane from Innisfail, Alta. 75 miles south of here, to Manitoba, Sask., 130 miles southeast of Regina.

The 368-mile 7½-hour flight gave him the Canadian Soaring Trophy, awarded annually for an outstanding flight, and the International Diamond 'C' Trophy, won by only two other Canadians.
