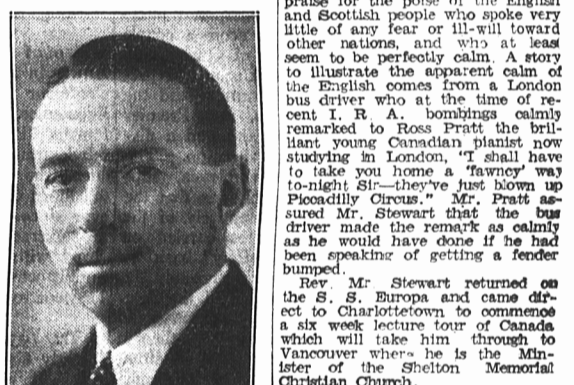

Comments On 'Calm And Poise' Of British People When Christian Youth from 73 nations and 220 separately organized religious groups gathered recently for a nine day world conference in Amsterdam, Holland, they received a message from Her Majesty the Queen of the Netherlands. Her Majesty said, "It is a great pleasure to me to know that you, who have come together from all parts of the world are united in my country. In the coming days may the Spirit through which Jesus Christ rules the life of every man, and which helps to solve all controversies and problems, show you the way." The World Conference of Christian Youth was attended by 57 Canadian Young People representing the Church as well as the Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A. and the Student Christian movement. Three Maritime young people attended in the persons of Miss Jean Creighton of Wolfville, Miss Ida Goddard, Moncton, and Miss Dorothy Wilson of Berwick, N. S. Rev. G. Hayden Stewart of Calgary, Alberta, who is a visitor on the Island this week will be telling the very interesting story of the Conference in Central Christian Church on Tuesday evening before leaving for meetings in Summerside on Thursday.
