Be it enacted by the City Council, of The City of Charlottetown, that section one of the said By-law, be amended by adding the following words:

"Provided never the less, that it shall be lawful for the City Council, upon the application of the owners or managers of any Opera House, Music Hall or other Public Hall of any kind, to grant a yearly license for such sum as may be determined upon, by resolution of said Council.

By-law Respecting the Sale of Meat.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:

1. Every person publicly selling meat (fresh, salted or corned) by retail within this city in any store, shop, house, warehouse or other building or in the public market building or in or from any meat wagon, cart, carriage, sleigh or other vehicle upon the public streets or highways of the said City by retail or in less quantities than by the carcass, shall obtain from the Mayor therefor a license as a meat Vendor, and the Mayor is hereby authorized to issue such license upon receiving the license fee hereinafter mentioned.

2. The License fee shall be Twenty-five dollars per annum.

3. No person shall expose for sale or publicly sell fresh, salted or corned meat by retail or in less quantities than by the carcass in any store, house, shop, warehouse or other building or place or in the public market building, or in or from any meat wagon, cart, carriage, sleigh or other vehicle within the said City, without having first obtained a License therefor in manner above mentioned.

4. Any person or persons guilty of any infraction of any of the Provisions of this By-law, shall, upon conviction before the Stipendiary Magistrate on the oath or affirmation of any credible witness, forfeit and pay at the discretion of the Stipendiary Magistrate a penalty not exceeding the sum of Thirty Dollars for each offence, exclusive of costs, and in default of payment thereof it shall and may be lawful for the said Stipendiary Magistrate to commit the offender to the Common Jail of the County of Queen's County for any period not exceeding thirty days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid. Provided further that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent persons from selling meat by the quarter on the public or market square adjoining the market building without such license, but all persons shall have the right therefore to sell meat of all kinds by the quarter on payment of the usual market tolls as at present or at any time hereafter may be provided. And Provided further that nothing herein contained shall be construed to require persons selling tinned or canned meats poultry or game to take out the License above mentioned.

The Dog's Bark.

As to barking, there are a great number of different sorts of barks, the meaning of each one of which is well known.

For example, there is the barking which at night is meant to call master's attention to the fact that some burglar or other evildoer is hovering around the premises. When I hear my Landseer Newfoundland or my splendid St. Bernard giving warning in this way, I turn on my other side and do but sleep the rounder, well knowing that no evildoer would dare to enter my premises or even my grounds. Some years ago every house in Twynford was entered by burglars except my own. With jimmies they had already opened a lower window of my villa, when they had to fly! The bark of warning has doubtless descended through long generations from the days when wild dogs hunted in packs, and it was then as useful in recalling stragglers as the bugle of a regiment.

Next there is the bark of joy, when a dog, for instance, meets again a kind and loving master who may have been absent for a few days. No mistaking this. It is the bark of pleasure and excitement. Sometimes my beautiful St. Bernard, Fair Helen of Troy, mingles a little friendly scolding with this, for after licking my cheeks and ears she backs astern and with her head cocked funnily to one side barks me a lecture.

"Why didn't you take me with you?" she seems to say. "It was cruel, and I've been wretched all the time. But I'm happy now. Don't ever, ever leave your Helen again."—Gordon Stables in Our Animal Friends.

Forest Fires of Canada.

According to Dr. Bell, in The Scottish Geographical Magazine, the forest fires of Canada are generally caused by lightning. In the great forest between Alaska and the strait of Bell Isle the portions recently burned are easily recognized by the tenderer green of their foliage from the parts which have been longer spared. The fire rushes along with the speed of a galloping horse. The branches and dead leaves on the ground burn like tinder, and the flames rise to nearly 200 feet. Resinous pine woods burn fastest. One of them extended 160 miles in ten hours. The traces of a fire remain for nearly a century. Birds and beasts are stifled or burned. Beavers and muskrats, which are amphibious, have a chance of saving their lives. After the fire a few trunks of the largest trees are left. Next spring roots begin to sprout and seeds to grow. In 15 or 20 years the soil is covered with poplars, willows, etc., which shelter young firs and other trees. In 50 years the conifers are uppermost, and in 100 the others are dying out beneath the pine wood. A third of the forest region of Alaska has trees of 50 years old, another third trees of 50 to 100 years and the rest trees over 100 years old. The fire seems to suit the banksian pine, as it opens the pines and sets free the grains. Without fires this species would hardly reproduce itself. Such fires took place even in the pleistocene epoch of geology.
