

# No Church Pressure On Margaret, Archbishop Says

LONDON (Reuters)—Dr. Geoffrey Fisher, Archbishop of Canterbury, declared in a television interview Wednesday night that there had been "no church pressure" on Princess Margaret before she renounced her marriage to Group Captain Peter Townsend.

The archbishop, interviewed in Lambeth Palace, his official London residence, said the princess made her decision "as she said, of her own free will."

But, in an apparent reference to the call made on him by the princess, he said that she asked for advice and knew where to go for it.

**SEEKING GOD'S WILL**

"She was seeking all the time for God's will, and then it became clear what God's will was, she did it, and it is not a bad thing for people in general to take note of."

The British Broadcasting Corporation had arranged the interview before the royal marriage crisis. It was not specifically arranged as an occasion for the archbishop to comment on the issue.

The 68-year-old primate of the Anglican Church, referred to in the statement by Margaret in which she thanked those who had prayed for her.

"Only people who have been praying for her can really understand the decisions that were demanded of her, the problems she had to face and the tearing of the heart one way or another. I use who prayed for her know what she has been through and those who have not don't."

# Jury Takes 13 Minutes To Acquit Girl Of Murder

BRANDON, Man. (CP)—An 11-member jury Wednesday took only 13 minutes to acquit 19-year-old Helen May Jackson of murder in the shooting of her 44-year-old father, Charles, in their Wawanesa, Man., district farm home Feb. 24.

Mr. Justice Samuel Freedman of court of Queen's bench congratulated the jury and said he concurred with the verdict.

The shooting occurred after Mr. Jackson allegedly had begun choking his wife.

Earlier Tuesday Helen testified with the jury excluded regarding a statement she had made to police officers. Mr. Justice Freedman ruled the statement inadmissible because he doubted it had been made "completely voluntarily."

The six-page statement was read sentence by sentence while Helen sat in the witness box. Throughout her short testimony she was in tears and had a handkerchief pressed to her face.

The statement read in part: "I had thought about killing him for a long time, but I never planned to do it. I just went and got my gun and came in and shot him."

Refusing to admit it as evidence, Mr. Justice Freedman said he was not satisfied the accused had been in a condition to understand the meaning of voluntary statement.

He also said there was a clear inducement held out by Dr. Norman Kester, the family doctor, who had been called to the farm home. Dr. Kester, also district coroner, had urged Helen to tell the police the complete truth. This, although given in a helpful, friendly fashion by her family doctor, could be construed as inducement even though innocently given,

# Was Oldest U. S. Practising Doctor

SHELBYVILLE, Ill. (AP)—The American Medical Association has named the oldest practising physician in the United States died at his home Sunday night. Dr. J. C. Westervelt, who was 100 years old, succumbed after a brief illness. He quit active practice last year because of failing eyesight and impaired hearing, but still maintained a clinic in his home, where he saw an occasional patient.

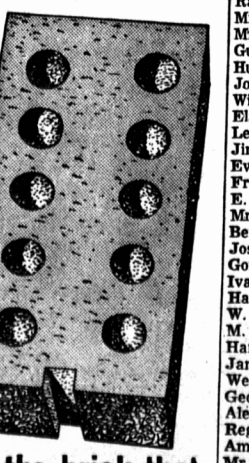

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# Free In Murder Of Three Boys

CHICAGO (AP)—A lie detector test has cleared one man seized in Wisconsin of any connection with the strangling of three boys and indicated his companion was not linked to the killings.

Charles Driscoll, 19, was exonerated Wednesday in his second examination under the machine. He and his companion, Ed Kline, 30, arrested Monday night at Lady Smith, Wis., volunteered for tests.

Officers called off at least until later a lie detector examination for Kline because, they reported, he is "too nervous." They said, however, that Driscoll had been asked under the machine whether he knew of any connection between Kline and the killings. The machine, detectives said, showed Driscoll was telling the truth when he said he did not.

The victims were Robert Peterson, 14, John Scheussler, 13, and his 11-year-old brother, Anton. Their naked and battered bodies were found Oct. 18, two days after they disappeared.
